I take those charges extremely seriously. I pray that I remain serious about my own walk with God so that it will spill out onto the lives of those whom I am privileged to shepherd at Ebenezer. My passion is to be serious about 4 things. *The first is passionate praise*. Jonathan Edwards once said, "The enjoyment of God is the only happiness with which our souls can be satisfied." God's praise is to be continually on our lips (Psalm 34:1) and is a sign of one whom the Holy Spirit has filled (Ephesians 5:18-20). *Secondly, I want to be passionate about prayer*. When one prays unceasingly (1 Thess. 5:17), he is declaring his absolute dependency upon God, his intimacy with him, and his concern for people. *The third passion of mine is the proclamation of the Word of God.* I want to preach his Word in season and out (2 Timothy 4:2), and watch lives change as God is more heard, adored and obeyed (Hebrews 4:12)! *Finally, I want to be passionate about people*. There are two people groups to be concerned about, the saints of our dear Lord and their growth in grace, and the other group includes the lost who do not know our precious Lord. I think if Ebenezer, empowered by the grace of God, strives to be passionate about those 4 things, we will continue to grow into the beautiful bride He wants us to be.

As you know, this particular bride began last year battered and scarred but our Kingly Husband, Jesus Christ, sustained us through this difficult time. It was a tender time, a tough time for all of our hearts. We still feel the loss of loved ones who have moved on. Many of you continue to interact with them, spend time with them, love them, and certainly pray for them. May God richly bless them as He uses them hopefully in another local church, but may we remember, we are all part of the same bride, the bride of Jesus Christ, even though we may not be worshipping together.

I praise Him for sustaining us through the storm. Often times, storms bring surprises, and it did for me this past February when I was called to be the Interim Senior Pastor for Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church, a role that I have somewhat assumed informally since the departure of Pastor Brian. It was a humbling and weighty call, one I am privileged to assume. My prayer to our precious Lord was to bring some calm and stability for a while and then be of help to launch EBFC into her next chapter of ministry for the glory of God and the good of his people. It has been a wonderful experience so far.

I have noticed that my passions are changing. I thoroughly enjoy praying, preparing and preaching the Word of God and marveling over Jesus Christ. I love to see the listeners doing the same, and taking that home with them as they live out their lives for His honor and glory. Preaching through Mark's gospel has been an immense joy for me, and I praise God for those of you who come through the line telling me of your greater fire and passion for Jesus. Many of you have expressed life changes that you have made and plan to make. There is no greater joy for a preacher than that! Personally, I plan on sharpening my skills by continuing to read books on preaching and listening to lectures/sermons from godly men who handle the Scriptures accurately and seek to have it burn in their bones (Jer. 20:9) and those who listen to them. Thank you for this immense privilege granted to me this past year.

As I think about a shepherd's many duties within the church I am reminded of a statement from the book, "Elders in Congregational Life," by Phil Newton. The elders studied this work a few years ago, but it is a valuable resource to turn to again and again. He states, Shepherding is hard work. The work of elders goes on in all conditions and situations. Elders are never off-duty when they leave the church building. An elder must attend to his own spiritual life, guarding his own family from spiritual dangers. He must maintain a godly example for the rest of the church. While others are resting, he will often be toiling on behalf of the church through study, prayer, ministry, counseling, visiting, and watching. Needless to say, I and the other brothers here at Ebenezer remain busy praying, teaching, leading, counseling, and visiting week in and week out.

I am grateful for the men God has placed here as overseers. Pastor Dick and Pastor Mark share the same heartbeat for doctrine and ministry that I have. We are always in each other's offices, sharpening, encouraging, and evaluating ourselves and our ministry, along with the ministries under our charge. I am grateful that these brothers take the time to critique my sermon every week.

The elders are a tremendous group of godly men and it's a breath of fresh Holy Spirit wind for me as we carry out our meetings in song, study, prayer, and the business of the church. These men take their role from Jesus seriously, in their teaching, leading committees, and delving into the lives of the sheep under their charge. It was a blessing for us to take our first ever retreat in remembered history this past summer and begin thinking about our vision and mission as we move forward as a church. Stay tuned, the time is ripe to begin this process. And we are extremely grateful to Pastor Carl Cassel, a retired BFC pastor, who met with us many times over the course of this past year, as elders and as a staff to offer insight and wise counsel. He also joined the congregation once per month, preaching twice and offering the pastoral prayer on other Sundays.

I would also be remiss if I didn't say "Thank You" many times over to the many servants of our Lord who serve in this church. I think of the deacons who work tirelessly in their specific areas. The staff at EBFC is invaluable to the ministry that is accomplished here, "Thank You!" And without volunteers, ministry would not get done and we would be guilty of not "equipping the saints for the work of the ministry." More needs to be done in this area, but much is being done already that I don't want to overlook.

On a personal note and often times unknown to you all, I continue to enjoy monthly gatherings of BFC pastors at our regional meeting at Cedar Crest BFC. I also meet with Tom Shorb, pastor of Coopersburg church every other month. I also plan to resume meeting with a group of Lehigh Valley pastors from the area every other Wednesday as well.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my work here, and I am extremely grateful for your support and words of encouragement. My family has felt this deeply too, thank you. It is a great privilege to work in our Lord's church, and to serve His people. May He remain central to everything we do.

The reality of the limitations of being human become more evident each year, but also, and this is a great thing, there comes with this an acute awareness that our sovereign God who is not encumbered by intangible things, nor does he possess any limitations, is in absolute control. His plan is always done, his goals are always complete, and nothing thwarts his activities. This amazing truth is a great comfort as we create our ministry plans for this new year, while realizing that he is doing a work in us and in his church that will not be thwarted, even by the gates of hell! Jesus Christ promised...

Jesus Christ commanded us before he ascended that we are to "Make Disciples." This command is fulfilled through the two-fold strategy of evangelism and teaching. Thus, we saw this past year a combined emphasis on equipping the saints through biblical expositional preaching from the pulpit, solid biblical teaching in our adult, youth, and children's Sunday Schools, and various bible studies and events for both men and women, and a renewed focus on the importance of prayer, so that those so equipped, would do the work of the ministry. This work of the ministry part began with evangelism training through the Share Your Faith Workshop, contacting newcomers, and benevolent service to reach the world outside our local church. There was also an attempt to deemphasize the social events side of ministry in order to place a greater emphasis on the fellowship/discipleship side.

For 2012, I see very little change in ministry strategy; however, all of us have a lot of work to do on the implementation part of making disciples by actually doing ministry work. We should work on building on what is already in place, but, are powerless unless we begin with a reemphasis on the absolute essential nature of prayer, not just private but also corporate. My goal is to have more teaching on prayer in 2012 and to hold several more prayer events. Concurrently with our prayer emphasis, our church can move forward to focus outwardly with evangelism and outreach. Ways to accomplish this in 2012 include evangelism training, door-to-door surveys, and encouraging each other to get involved with one another's needs. The Elders also plan to continue evaluating each current ministry to understand if their focus aligns with our ministry strategy.

Please continue to pray and ask the Lord what part you might have in fulfilling this vision for 2012. Remember that we are in this together as the living, visible, functioning body of Christ.

Kids Crossing Children's Ministry was blessed to have a productive year in 2011 filled with continual growth. I continue to serve on Wednesday nights as a small group leader for seven 2nd grade girls at FaithWeaver Friends. This summer, I was a group leader during VBS and also taught a special lesson on Israel.

As Kids Crossing Assistant, I also fulfilled many administrative tasks in addition to helping the Pastor of Discipleship. ¹ Here is a trustworthy saying: If anyone sets his heart on being an overseer, he desires a noble task. ² Now the overseer must be above reproach, the husband of but one wife, temperate, self-controlled, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, ³ not given to drunkenness, not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome, not a lover of money. ⁴ He must manage his own family well and see that his children obey him with proper respect. ⁵ (If anyone does not know how to manage his own family, how can he take care of God's church?) ⁶ He must not be a recent convert, or he may become conceited and fall under the same judgment as the devil. ⁷ He must also have a good reputation with outsiders, so that he will not fall into disgrace and into the devil's trap.

- 1Timothy 3:1-7

It's a weighty thing to be an overseer. The book of Hebrews tells us to "...keep watch over you as men who must give an account" (Hebrews 13:17). We take this charge from our Lord very seriously, so we strive with all of His energy to build up this church for His glory and your good. Phil Newton has broken down the duties of elders into four categories: **Doctrine, Discipline, Direction, and Distinction**.

We are charged with the task of holding our <u>doctrine</u> closely because it is a matter of life and death (1 Tim. 4:16). Paul tells Titus to "hold firmly to the trustworthy message as it has been taught, so that he can encourage others by sound doctrine and refute those who oppose it" (Titus 1:9). Since we are to be the primary teachers (Acts 6:2, 1 Tim. 3:2), we better know and handle the word of our Lord correctly (2 Tim. 2:15). <u>Discipline</u> entails more than just church discipline for Phil Newton. It includes church discipline but it also includes all of the "one anothering" that should be happening in a church, encouraging, correcting, training, and rebuking so that we all become fully mature and more and more conformed into the image of the Lord Jesus Christ. <u>Direction</u> includes setting the vision and mission of the church, but it also includes the "priestly" role of being involved in the sheep's lives, and the "kingly" role of governing the daily life of the church. Lastly, <u>distinction</u> is the most humbling category of all, modeling the Christian life. Peter told the elders to be "examples to the flock" (1 Peter 5:3). A tall order indeed! That's why we depend fully on our Chief Shepherd's grace to be faithful leaders of this local body. The practical out working of this are as follows:

The Elders met twice a month from February through November to worship, study, pray and conduct the business of the church. Pastor Dick has been teaching us the Bible Fellowship Articles of Faith so that we will be edified and knowledgeable of the church's doctrine. We have also had special meetings devoted to budget review and a joint meeting with the Deacons. This past July, we spent considerable time in prayer, vision casting, and formulating the next steps for hiring a Senior Pastor at our Elder's retreat, which we hope to continue doing on an annual basis.

Adult Electives

Discipleship Ministry

Adult Electives are our Adult classes that run at 10:05am Sunday mornings. On average we have around 130 people regularly attending these teaching sessions. Unlike Kinships that are usually focused more on relationships than teaching, the Adult Electives focus more on teaching than on relationships. It is one of the main teaching arms of Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church.

Review of 2011:

In 2011 we held 17 classes. During this year we completed the yearlong study on the book of Luke.

Led by Scott Holwick, this was our first class that went for a full year (instead of a single semester). Feedback was positive, and so we are continuing that concept with the following books: Genesis (begun in the Fall of 2011), Numbers, Romans, Acts, and Revelation. These "yearlong" studies will begin in the fall and conclude in the spring (feedback from the Luke class suggested we avoid the summer semester). The goal of these will be 1) to go slower through the details of the book and 2) provide an opportunity to bring in more references to other passages of the lessons taught in the book.

Planning 2012:

As we began planning for 2012 we were looking to improve on the following items:

- 1) The usefulness of our online sites for access to materials
- 2) Build up and be more consistent with our New Believers track (Discipleship Essentials, Basic Theology, Everyday Evangelism (EV2), Spiritual Formation, OT Survey, NT Survey).
- 3) Developing additional teachers through the Teacher Training Process

Elder Ministry

Over the past year, we have been continuing to develop and work on a way to help those new to Ebenezer get better acquainted and connected with the church. These efforts have focused on everything from helping them understand who we are as a local body and what we believe to better connecting with people so they truly feel like they *belong*. Two components of this process have been *Welcome Desserts* and *Networking*.

Welcome Desserts:

These desserts are scheduled about once per quarter. They are an informal time where a smaller group of people can learn more about the church and meet others. They are also a way for us to find out how to better serve those new to the church and how we can present ways to connect them to the church body. The Maderas family has opened their home this year for these marvelous times of refreshment, fellowship and encouragement.

Networking:

"The Right People in the Right Places for the Right Reasons" is something we should all keep in the forefront as we continue to work out where God has called us to uniquely serve Him in order to build up the Kingdom based on our God-given Passion, Spiritual Gifts and Personality Style.

At Ebenezer, we are using Networking as the primary approach to connect people with service opportunities within the various ministries of the church. This is accomplished by aligning an individual's profile with ministry position descriptions that are provided by ministry leaders. This process is divided into two sections. The Discovery Session is the group setting in which the material is presented. After completing the profiles in the Discovery portion of the process, each person has an individual session with a consultant to talk through the Ministry Profile and make the best person-ministry match. In order for this to be most effective, it is critical that each member of the congregation go through the Network process. It is also important that ministry leaders communicate the service opportunities within their ministries so that the best fit can be found.

During 2011, three Discovery Sessions were scheduled, but only one was actually held because of lack of participation.

If you have not yet been through the Network Discovery Session, please prayerfully consider attending one in 2012. Even if you are already serving in the ministry which you know you are gifted in and called to, you will benefit from having your Passion for ministry, your Spiritual Gifts and your Personality Style affirmed. The result will be the confirmation that where you are serving is the place you should be to fill the unique role that God has designed for you, equipped you for and prepared for you to do.

Final Remarks:

We continue to work at building and sustaining a process where people will develop the sense of *belonging* to the life of the church. We believe that as God works in people's hearts, one of the outward signs that He is transforming them to *become* more like Him will be a desire to serve Him by serving the church body.

Benevolence

Deacon Ministry

We want to thank heartily the members and attendees EBFC who contributed \$23,042.54 to the Benevolence Fund. The Benevolence Committee approved and distributed \$23,182.76 to those in need both inside and outside our congregation. At the end of December, we have a balance of \$14,178.15 in the Benevolence Fund. In 2011, EBFC gave financial assistance to many families.

Besides helping out financially, we have provided financial counseling on several occasions. We require anyone who needs assistance more than once to meet with one of the financial counselors on the Benevolence Committee to help them create a sustainable budget and teach them the basics on how God wants us to handle our money.

In 2011 we again gave out over \$1,300 in Giant Gift cards at Thanksgiving and Christmas. At Christmas time, the YACS also provided turkeys and other fixings for these families. Without the generous financial support of those giving to the Benevolence Fund, none of these support efforts could have happened. And of course, neither could the significant financial support we have given to many people in their time in need.

The members of EBFC and the Benevolence Committee are following God's principle that he laid out for His chosen people in Leviticus 25: 35 – 36, "If any of your fellow Israelites become poor and are unable to support themselves among you, help them as you would a foreigner and stranger, so they can continue to live among you. Do not take interest or any profit from them, but fear your God, so that they may continue to live among you."

On behalf of those serving on the Benevolence Committee, it is a privilege to serve in this role, carrying out for the members of EBFC the charge that God gave us in helping those in need.

I would like to thank both current and past members of the Benevolence Committee for their time and dedication in serving our Lord and the EBFC congregation in this capacity. It certainly is a privilege and an honor to serve with each one of them.

Bible Memory Program:

The Bible Memory Program's goal is to encourage and motivate students in Kindergarten through eighth grade to memorize the Word of God so that they will carry it with them the rest of their lives. FaithWeaver Friends MidWeek:

This is year two of FWF Midweek discipleship program utilizing Group Publishing's FaithWeaver Midweek curriculum. This curriculum addresses every major theme throughout the entire bible in three years. This program, much like our VBS program, does challenge children in their walk with Christ and provides a gender specific small group setting for personal growth and mentoring. This program continues to reinforce what was learned the previous Sunday in Sunday School and Children's Church.

We have two age specific groups comprising of a preschool group, ages four through kindergarten, and an elementary group, grades one through five. We start and end our Wednesday evenings in a large group setting, but break the children into small gender specific groups for activities and mentoring. We currently minister to 50 children in the 1^{st} – 5^{th} grade age group and 18 in the preschool age group.

This program would not be possible without the commitment of adult leaders. We have been blessed to have twenty-two adult leaders and one teen to mentor the children and run the activity centers.

In addition to our usual Wednesday evening program, the children had a few special events. In February, they had a roller skating outing at the Bethlehem Skateaway and in December, they ministered to residents at Country Meadows by singing Christmas carols and giving cookies and hand-made cards.

It is the expectation from here forward that funeral luncheons will not be seen as a church service requiring reimbursement but instead a gift of service to congregation members. Emergency Meals (Judy Lasso)

We have had no emergency meal requests in 2011. This is due in part to fluctuations in changing pastoral responsibilities and assumed kinship involvement. The process should continue to be evaluated in 2012.

The Kitchen continues to be stocked and maintained by Beth Hoppes. Linda Tona continues to fill the role of kitchen event coordinator. 2 events required kitchen assistance this year.

Helping Hands:

Due to minimal volunteer support it has become evident that Helping Hands is no longer a good serving format for our church and will be dissolved as a result. The purpose of Kinship Groups is to be a microcosm of our local church to provide smaller informal gatherings for growing in our faith in God and friendship with one another. Our goals are to nurture, fellowship, worship, care, train, serve, and grow. Kinship strives to take various people with different experiences and backgrounds and simulate them into one body and one faith. This encourages growth and community at different age groups, family status, and genders.

Currently, there are 251 involved in 14 Kinship Groups, 164 adults and 87 children. What are some of the challenges with groups? Kinship is one of the major threads of our church. Having enough group leaders continues to be difficult. As new people come into the church and seek to join a group, we have very limited space for them within the existing Kinships. Work is being devoted to identifying and training new leaders so that more groups can be formed to increase our capacity.

For 2012, we continue to view Kinship groups as one of the core ministries here at EBFC. Therefore, we will continue to train leaders to provide the watch-care necessary to meet the needs of each group, and in turn this should reflect in a congregation who is being fed, having their spiritual, physical, and emotional needs met, and are reaching out to help others with the love of Christ.

Library

Discipleship Ministry

In 2011 we marked the 25th anniversary of the Ebenezer Growth Garden Library. Please partner with us in praying for God's guidance for the coming year.

The Library was able to purchase about \$3,000 worth of non-fiction and fiction books, DVDs and audios for children, teens and adults this year. We have continued to add to our audio books and compact discs area. The library strives to maintain a selection of the newest Christian materials and to make selections that appeal to all ages and levels of spiritual maturity. Each week approximately 75 items are checked in and out, increasing to as many as 100 during the summer months. The added space has also eased the congestion we experienced in the old library. We owe many thanks to those who donated time and resources to help us transition to our beautiful new library. The hard work that was provided has made it possible for us to continue our mission. We praise God for all that the congregation and church leadership has done to help the library flourish. Our goal is to be a ministry that is a warm welcoming environment where everyone can come and find resources to help their spiritual growth. Our church has a valuable ministry in its library. The library has many wonderful volunteers; we however find ourselves this coming year in need of more individuals willing to work an occasional Sunday morning. Please contact me if you are interested in helping.

Security Committee

Deacon Ministry

The Security Committee was formed to provide greater security awareness, identifying the need to provide a safe worship environment at Ebenezer.

We are honored to see the work God has done this year through His faithful servants on this committee and look forward to how He will provide grace and mercy throughout the coming year.

Two Deacons, seven active-duty law enforcement officers, and three other volunteers serve on the Security Team. Our primary function is to provide an atmosphere of comfort, refuge and worship, where congregants and visitors are able to worship God in prayer, song and learning. We work in concert with the ushers and greeters to respond more quickly to potential breaches or disturbances while enabling the Sunday morning worship to continue at full strength without meddlesome interruption.

We monitor activity inside the building and in the parking lot before, during and after Sunday morning worship services, and serve as the primary contact with local first responders (law enforcement, fire, EMS) in the event of a disruptive incident. This includes, but is not limited to individual suspicious behavior, theft, disorderly conduct, acts of violence, and/or the need for professional assistance.

Basic functions provided by the Security Team at each Sunday morning service include:

- Maintenance of a physical presence, patrolling the grounds in an effort to deter crime or mischief;
- Remaining alert for and reporting on suspicious behavior or circumstances that may attend property loss or personal injury;
- Limiting access to areas of the church (such as offices) where visitors are not allowed on Sunday mornings;
- Monitoring and escorting staff & volunteers carrying money, such as tithes, offerings or other gifts;
- Primary point of contact between EBFC and local first responders (police, fire, EMS, etc.);
- Investigating and communicating security breaches to church leadership in a formal manner;
- Maintenance of a current log of security incidents;
- Verifying select doors and windows are secured during Sunday morning services;
- Working in concert with the on-duty Head Usher in support of the Security Policy.

During 2011:

- Continued work on a Standard Operating Procedure draft which will be routed for review.
- Maintained a security team schedule and presence for Sunday morning services.
- Delivered security orientation for all Security Team Members and Head Ushers; will be introduced for all Ushers and Greeters in 2012.
- Working in concert with the Property Committee, Facilities team and Fox Alarm, we upgraded our surveillance system to enable the flexibility of video capture, recording and playback features.
 - o In 2012 the building alarm system will be integrated with the surveillance system, enhancing our ability to assist local law enforcement in the event of any criminal activity.
- Due to a number of factors, including our continuing presence, no notable incidents occurred in 2011.

But as for you, teach what accords with sound doctrine.² Older men are to be sober-minded, dignified, self-controlled, sound in faith, in love, and in steadfastness.³ Older women likewise are to be reverent in behavior, not slanderers or slaves to much wine. They are to teach what is good,⁴ and so train the young women to love their husbands and children,⁵ to be self-controlled, pure, working at home, kind, and submissive to their own husbands, that the word of God may not be reviled.⁶ Likewise, urge the younger men to be self-controlled.⁷ Show yourself in all respects to be a model of good works, and in your teaching show integrity, dignity,⁸ and sound speech that cannot be condemned, so that an opponent may be put to shame, having nothing evil to say about us.
[~] Titus 2:1-8 ESV

As we have ministered to students during the past year, this passage of Scripture has been one that our youth staff has rallied around. Titus 2 makes it clear that all the men and women in the church body should be ministering to the younger men and women. This is really the heart of student ministry - men and women who love Jesus spending time with young men and women who we desire to love Jesus.

Youth ministry shouldn't be as complicated as we make it out to be sometimes. It is not about the flash and hype, but about relationship. If we as men and women will live the way that Titus 2 calls us to, and spend time "doing life" with the teenagers that God has entrusted to us - we will see real discipleship happen.

One of our biggest heartbeats as youth workers is to see our ministry become increasingly more relational than attractional. Do we want to be a place that attracts young people? Absolutely. But that is not our focal point, and that is not where we want to invest the bulk of our time. The truth is, more student ministry happens outside of the large group setting than inside.

This is why two of our biggest pillars are mentoring and growth groups. These are times when our students get to experience a discipleship relationship, and where the truths that they learn in youth group are fleshed out.

Pray for us as we continue to seek what God has for the student ministry, and pray for mentors to be raised up for God's glory!

Some of the things God has accomplished through us this past year are:

- The continuation of a mentoring ministry which has been successful with students.
- A growing awareness of a need to partner with parents and minister to them. This endeavor will have exponential effects on our students.
- A productive mission trip to New Mexico. Despite unforeseen events in my family which prevented us from going, the team had an excellent trip and were quite a blessing to the Allen's.
- Our youth staff has grown even closer through staff meetings, a staff retreat, and a staff training weekend.
- Our Invert group (student leadership) has grown through a retreat and has started to focus on evangelism seeing those God has put in our sphere of influence come to know Christ.
- We have spent a good deal of time in middle and high school youth group focusing on evangelism this is central to our calling as Christians, and we have not given this the attention it deserves before now.

<u>In 2012:</u> We will continue to help our staff serve our Lord by providing an efficient, reliable and secure computer network. We also continue to maintain and improve our website; "Aplaceforyou.org".

<u>Challenges:</u> Our biggest challenge continues to be troubleshooting network, hardware, and software issues during business hours. When the network is down, staff productivity can grind to a halt. This makes it imperative that solutions be found as quickly as possible, so finding a team member available at the time a problem occurs is imperative, yet often difficult.

Mark has sacrificed an inordinate amount of time to all the above mentioned tasks. He has also self educated himself on much of the software applications, most significantly the server OS. Transportation Committee

Deacon Ministry

During 2011, we saw consistent use (equivalent to 2010) of the church vehicles (2008 Ford Omnibus, assembled by ElDorado National; and a 1997 Ford E-350 Econoline van). However, the need for rental vans was significantly less than in 2010. Rental vehicles are used (in addition to EBFC's vehicles) when the ministry in need of transportation requires more seating than EBFC's vehicles provide, and when it is impractical for multiple volunteer vehicles to be driven.

2011:

- The van had some transmission work, as well as some 'Tune-up' maintenance items, performed at the end of 2011; thanks to Don at Hillside Auto for his continued service and generosity in providing service with significant savings to the church.
- The mini-bus had a few minor recall items repaired over the summer.
- The committee continues discussion of viable options for replacement of the van. Purchase of a new van is being pursued due to specific concerns regarding the reliability of the current van; decreasing rental availability in the Lehigh Valley and increasing rental costs, are also a factor.
- Transportation Fund (for purchase of additional/replacement vehicles) is now over \$16,000. If you desire to contribute to this fund, simply write "Transportation Fund" along with the amount given, under the "Special" section of an offering envelope.

MOPS (Mothers of Preschoolers):

MOPS International exists to encourage, equip and develop every mother of preschoolers to realize her potential as a woman, mother and leader in the name of Jesus Christ.

MOPS stands for Mothers of Preschoolers. MOPS International exists to meet the needs of every mom - urban, suburban and rural moms, stay-at-home and working moms, teen, single and married moms - moms with different lifestyles who all share a similar desire to be the very best moms they can be. MOPS recognizes that the years from infancy through kindergarten are foundational in a mother-child relationship and are filled with unique needs. MOPS helps moms through relationships established in the context of local groups that provide a caring atmosphere for today's mother of young children. Our group here at Ebenezer reaches out to more than 46 moms, more than half of whom do not attend Ebenezer. We meet on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays each month from September through May.

We have over 80 children in our MOPPETS program led by approximately 20 wonderful helpers who teach our children about Jesus, love them and care for them. MOPPETS is still our biggest struggle and greatest need. Trying to find volunteers to help in each of our classrooms is an area we continually lift in prayer. However, God is good and the workers we have are faithful. We continue to offer a room specifically dedicated to homeschooled children. This room continues to grow and is now comprised of approximately 10 children.

Our current theme is "Momsense" and our theme verse is "God doesn't want us to be shy with his gifts but bold and loving and sensible." 2 Timothy 1:7

We are learning how children change the relationships we have with our husbands, our friends, their siblings, and with God. We are learning to share MOPS wherever we go so no mom is alone.

We continue to have fine and engaging speakers come and share God's Word and offer solid teaching on marriage, parenting, and the passing of our faith as a legacy to our children. We anticipate hearing topics ranging from sound financial advice, organizing our homes, healthy menu planning, and maintaining physical fitness.

We have 14 moms in leadership positions, five of whom are Discussion Group Leaders (some also steering), five Assistant Discussion Group Leaders, and six Steering Team Members.

In April 2011, we had a couple of Steering Team Members attend a MOPS training seminar, and in August 2011we had four leaders attend the annual MOPS convention in Nashville, Tennessee. We look forward to possible attendance of future MOPS training seminars as they become available.

Specifically, we request prayer for the MOPS ministry for next year. Several, if not all, of the steering team may or will not be returning next year. Doris Lynch and Anne Christiansen will be graduating from the MOPS program and other vacancies may exist. This ministry is so vitally important and necessary and so loved by so many. Ebenezer has created and established a well run MOPS ministry that has blessed many, many women over the years.

EBFC Financial Report for 2011

Our general fund income of \$877,109.46 was below the anticipated budgeted amount by \$42,804.54. This giving is at 95% of the 2011 budgeted amount, and this difference may be attributed to a decrease in attendance over the year. We had a substantial donation come from one person who is not part of our congregation which helped close the gap.

Thanks to the ministry leaders who were diligent in managing the individual budget lines as the budgeted expenses were at \$829,888.96 (90% of projected).

Giving to designated funds was steady for 2011, and this specifically enabled the upgrades to be carried out in the sanctuary through the Building Fund. The two other significant funds for the year were Faith Promise, which is used for the needs of missionaries and short-term missions requests, and the Benevolence Fund, which is used to help those in need in our community.

The financial status throughout 2011 and going into 2012 is positive with a stable outlook. There was a decrease in assets of \$38,570.54. Our current assets going into 2012 are \$590,654.47 which includes \$74,693.52 as cash in the designated funds.

Let us continue to be thankful to God for providing for our needs. May we prayerfully seek how we worship through our individual giving, and let us ask Him to help us to be good stewards to build the Kingdom as God leads.
