There is nothing more sobering than to know that as a Pastor in ministry, I serve the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords. As a pastor my heart's desire is to honor the Lord and to be "useful to the Master." It may sound like a copout, but ministry is somewhat of a paradox. While Pastors serve the Lord, the fruit of the ministry is the product of God's good hand.

And at the same time, God blesses the faithfulness of His servants. It is my prayer that the ministry conducted in 2016 was faithful to the Lord. I believe that while it is difficult to measure success, the Lord was faithful in producing great fruit in the ministry of Ebenezer Bible Fellowship.

The ministry of the Word of God may be the most important part of ministry. In a day when many churches do not practice expository preaching, we believe that this method of preaching is a key to a healthy church. Therefore the majority of the sermons preached at EBFC are expository in nature. Even guest speakers are asked to be faithful to a particular text rather than a topic. The emphasis of my sermons in 2016 was in the New Testament, particularly in 1 Peter & 2 Peter. Guest speakers and the other Pastors also preached other sermons. I was injured in a basket-ball accident in March and had surgery in April. Pastor Dick & Mark were gracious to preach in my absence.

In addition to Sunday morning, I also teach on Wednesday night. The majority of the lessons were from Matthew 17-28 in 2016. Wednesday nights provide a wonderful opportunity for in-depth Bible study and prayer meeting. We averaged around 20-25 people each week. We always sing, study and then pray together. It is one of my favorite nights of the week. It is a joy to teach God's Word.

In addition to the ministry of preaching, I participated in the ministry of counseling and mentoring. I continue to have many sessions with church members for the encouragement of their discipleship. This is one of my joys to be with our people praying with them and encouraging them in the Lord.

Leadership development was also a highlight of the year. I led a LEAD class for Deacons. We had 4 men participate which in turn we had 3 men voted in to be new Deacons. It was a great class and I enjoyed going through Alexander Strauch's book, the New Testament Deacon. I'm so thankful that the Lord is continuing to raise up men to serve the Lord here at Ebenezer BFC.

So much more could be written, but in short, here are a few highlights that God's grace permitted in 2016:

- 4 New member classes conducted throughout the year with 53 attendees
- Preached through 1 Peter, 2 Peter, Christmas series
- Taught a Leadership Class (LEAD) to a new set of Deacons 5 classes
- Chaired the nominating committee having 8-10 interviews for Elders & Deacons
- Lead a Kinship Group in my house with approximately 20 in attendance, teaching through Romans.
- Performed 4 funerals
- Performed 2 weddings
- Performed over 40 Hospital & home visitations
- Performed premarital Counseling for 2 couples including 6-8 sessions each
- Over 70 meetings with Church members/individuals for prayer/encouragement/counseling
- I participated as a member of the board of BFC Church Extension 6 meetings/year
- I participated as a member of the Transitional Leadership Team (TLT) for Forks Township Church Plant under the direction of Tim Zuck 4 meetings/year
- I chaired the TLT for Naples, Florida Church Plant under the direction of Jason Filbert 6 meetings/year
- Over 24 baptism interviews
- Over 40 membership interviews
- Performed 5 child dedications
- Continuing to mentor a couple of men on a regular basis
- Held staff meetings two times per month
- Mentored a pastoral intern meeting approximately 2 times per month
- Taught a marriage discussion at MOPS with my wife
- Chaired the Elder meetings once per month with at least 2 special called meetings
- Led out in the teaching time for VBS along with my wife and kids
- Attend monthly Welcome Desserts for newcomers all year
- Held monthly telephone calls with Jason Filbert in Naples, FL for encouragement of church plant
- Attended the BFC Ministerial Convention & BFC Annual Conference
- Attended the BCS Pastoral Appreciation breakfast at EBFC
- Led a short devotion at the Lehigh Valley Prayer Breakfast golf outing fundraiser at Southmoore Golf Course
- Participated in the Bethlehem Christian School Open House handed out info about EBFC
- Participated in a BFC Study Group writing a few papers on the divorce issue of 1 Corinthians 7:15 issue of "enslaved"
- Attended several graduation, birthday, anniversary, & Christmas parties of church members
- Didn't run but participated in the 5K race Run for the Children
- Participated in every men's prayer breakfast 4/year
- Helped one individual move and then relocate to another state in order to enter a drug & alcohol program
- Participated in the After School Bible Club at Freemansburg
- Participated in Operation Christmas Child
- Participated in security training for in house staff
- Went to court to encourage a hurting church attendee
- Participated in evangelism training class
- Highlighted Miracle Month in December raising \$20,953 for missions

The stability of our church remains strong both theologically and philosophically. Our new membership class continues to highlight the importance of doctrine and a ministry philosophy, which flows out of sound doctrine. Pastor Dick & I continue to lay a foundation of the importance of the Bible as the sole authority for the Christian life as well as for the Church. We have been blessed this year by having many new members who are excited about a Church with a strong commitment to the Bible from the pulpit to the ministries of the Church.

This last year has been a very difficult one for me, after injuring myself in March of 2016, tearing 3 ligaments in my right knee. The Lord has taught me some valuable lessons that I believe have made me a better pastor. I am so appreciative of the pastoral staff who taught for me while I was unable to preach. I'm also so thankful for a body of Elders and Deacons who are committed to the glory of God and the Gospel. We have an incredible staff who I'm so proud to work alongside. Their Christ-like spirit, hard work, attention to detail, and so much more makes me truly appreciate working with such an incredible staff. I am truly looking forward to what the Lord is going to do in 2017.

As I begin this year's annual report, I want to share with you some thoughts from my personal bible study trek through the Old Testament, and stopping at the book of Ezekiel, I came across this, re-occurring phrase, found in this verse as an example:

""Thus shall my anger spend itself, and I will vent my fury upon them and satisfy myself. **And they shall know that I am the Lord**—that I have spoken in my jealousy—when I spend my fury upon them." (Ezekiel 5:13, ESV)

This phrase, "And they shall know that I am the Lord", occurs 72 times in the book of Ezekiel. Amidst the pronouncements of judgment upon Israel and their surrounding enemies; amidst the encouraging words of blessings, this phrase is repeated. Then it dawned on me, isn't that why God does everything? God is not foreign; is not hiding; has not created and stepped away to allow things to wind down on their own. But our God is knowable! He revels himself in creation. He reveals himself in righteous judgment. He reveals himself in common, gracious blessings. Ultimately, God revealed himself in and through his son, the Lord Jesus Christ. Why would he do that? It is because, through our hope and faith in Christ, we bring him glory!

"so that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of his glory." (Ephesians 1:12, ESV)

It is with this truth, that I present to you those things done for the glory of God in 2016.

The glory of God was seen several times throughout 2016 with our involvement in serving at the *Lynfield Community* in South Bethlehem, contacting newcomers, and creating a discipleship pool to intentionally disciple people who request us to do so. We began a men's prayer group on Saturday mornings to encourage men to be leaders in praying for their families, their church, and their country. We continued to see growth in our *Kinship* groups, as two additional groups were added.

The children's ministries continue to direct our children toward spiritual growth as children learn the scriptures chronologically in their age appropriate Sunday School (Cross Time) classes, using *The Gospel Project* curriculum, and by memorizing scripture and learning biblical doctrine in the *Awana* program. We also held two evangelistic events, Vacation Bible School (VBS) in the summer, and a Candy Carnival in the fall.

The Student Ministries (HS & MS Youth Groups) were met with a new challenge toward the end of 2016. Pastor Mark Culton received a call from a church in Indiana, and believing it was the Lord's will, resigned from his position of 8 years as Youth Pastor at Ebenezer BFC. Though very excited for Mark, nonetheless, he will be sorely missed and has left us with some holes to fill. The first, and most important hole, was for a strong Bible teacher who could teach our youth in an expository way. Praise the Lord this was met by hiring Mark Evans part-time as our Interim Youth Teacher to teach at Tuesday night youth group. Mark Evans has 12+ years of youth ministry experience and is an ordained pastor in the BFC. The next hole was normal Tuesday night meetings apart from the teaching and the planned activities for the youth. This hole was filled, praise the Lord, with the volunteer youth staff themselves. The final hole is to fill the position of Youth Pastor with a new full-time pastor. This will be done with the newly formed Youth Pastor Search Committee, consisting of myself, Heather Hunsberger, Suzi Hardy, Lori Bernhardt, Pat Barry, and Swannie Griffin. The search committee has begun its activities early in 2017.

The adult ministries sought to equip our adults toward spiritual growth in 2016 through biblical expositional teaching in the Adult Sunday School Classes (Adult Electives), quarterly men's breakfasts, two Thursday morning men's bible studies, various women's bible studies, and a newly formed Seniors Fellowship.

Also in 2016, we continued to implement the state mandated background checks for children's ministry workers who are 18 years-old and above. This, we believe, will provide the best possible security for the precious children placed in our care. Along with these background checks, we provided iPads for the teachers to enable them to, check-in/check-out their students, have emergency contact and medical information at their fingertips in case of an emergency, and to allow them easy access to the Children's Ministry (Kid's Crossing) policies and procedures.

For 2017, besides what has already been established in our own local church Discipleship Ministries, we plan to maximize the effectiveness of our outreach programs through our evangelism and teaching programs, with an increased presence in South Bethlehem's Lynfield Community as a church wide ministry and not just for our youth. We want to create a passion for corporate prayer through monthly prayer services, and finally, we want to provide more people and opportunities for our discipleship pool to function.

Please continue to pray and ask the Lord what part you might have in fulfilling our vision for 2017, as we continue to be challenged by our volunteer needs, especially in the children's ministries, and Adult Elective teachers. Remember that we are in this together as the living, visible, functioning body of Christ.

"And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up." (Gal 6:9 ESV)

December 1st will mark 8 years of ministry at Ebenezer, and with that my time will come to a close. God has called me on to a ministry in NW Indiana at Bethel Church, but I give Him praise for a fulfilling and fruitful year of student ministry in 2016!

Some things God accomplished through the student ministry this past year:

- A continual growth in partnership with parents. Every year that goes by my heart has enlarged for parents, and now that I have 2 children in student ministry, this has certainly become an emphasis for me and I believe it has trickled down to the rest of the youth staff.
- A rewarding Sno-Glo for MS and HS where the focus of the weekend was "Deliverance from Sin" from the book of Judges.
- 21 days of prayer uniting teens and adults in our church ("Pray21"). One of the things we did again was create a devotional for each day of Pray21, written by our youth volunteers. I think this was a really neat way to minister to our students and those who prayed with our students.
- Had a great Dare 2 Share trip in D.C. where we learned how to better share our faith. The theme was "Live it Up"
- A local missions trip to South Bethlehem (Light in the City). This was the third year in a row ministering to our neighbors in Lynfield, and it is exciting to see the doors God has opened and how the ministry continues to expand there.
- Several "day trips" of ministry with our friends in the Lynfield community. This was a way to build relationships. We went to a gymnastics studio, a trampoline park, and tubing down the Delaware.
- A great "Kickback" where our theme was "Rest" We considered how God wants us to rest and apply the Sabbath principle. Students actually survived the weekend without their electronic devices.
- We continued our monthly "Illuminite," and by the end of the year moved back to having these nights combined, MS and HS.
- Our youth staff continues to grow closer through joint staff meetings, a staff training weekend, and a staff retreat where we went to Ocean Grove.
- Our Invert group remained inactive, and the only student leadership training that is being done is with the Illuminite team.
- We continue to value our weekly small group time, where growth group leaders are able to connect with their students and personalize what they are hearing in teaching time.
- In our high school ministry we studied through the books of 1 John and Ruth.
- With MS, we continued through our cycle of the Core Truth curriculum, focusing this past year on "Loving God" and "Loving Others".
- Continued to use the SS curriculum called "The Gospel Project" with MS and HS. We are now finally in sync with the Elementary ages, so all children and teens are going through the same passages each week.
- We continue to have growth group leaders walk through several years of ministry to a specific group of students. I believe this has opened the door for deeper mentoring.
- Quarterly "Family Nights" at youth group.
- I had the opportunity to be on a few school campuses this past year Easton, BCS, LVCHS, and Lehigh University
- Finish pre-marital counseling with 2 couples, and marry one of them. I also started pre-marital counseling with another couple who will be married in 2017.
- Continuation of a bi-weekly parent email newsletter. I have heard good feedback on this, and I believe it is an effective way to talk to parents.
- Meet with numerous teens and parents of teens.

Some areas of prayer for the coming year are:

- Pray that the elders and youth staff implement a transition since I am leaving December 5th. This may involve the teaching from elders, or an interim youth pastor until the next pastor can be hired.
- That God would sustain the youth staff and GG leaders during the transition, and give them patience, hope and courage.

1. Worship Ministry:

Shepherding:

Typically every Wednesday night practice is started with a short devotional or reading of scripture. We then prepare and practice the worship for Sunday's service and finish the night with a time of prayer. Our prayer time is necessary in helping us, as a team, to stay unified by knowing and bearing each other's burdens and in seeking direction and wisdom from the Spirit. When we meet on Wednesday nights our practice time is not solely preparing the songs. We usually have a closing time of sharing and prayer. This year I have really been challenged on the subject of prayer. I was able to lead worship at and also attend the BFC Ministerium retreat in October. Pastor Cliff Boone, from Cedar Crest BFC, talked about our prayer life. The focus of our prayer should be more focused on who God is and what He is doing rather than solely our requests. What we have been integrating into our practices is a more intentional focus on praying "God I thank you because..." this leads us to reflect on God and not on our circumstances. We continue to share prayer requests, but this new focus has really helped start our time of prayer afresh. In addition to these changes on Wednesday nights we also have been making our scripture reading and prayer time on Sunday mornings more focused on God's work being accomplished through our music team and the congregation as a whole, so that God is ultimately glorified and praised through our morning offering.

Before our Sunday services, we have a time of prayer in the conference room with a challenge from scripture. This helps us to prepare our hearts for worship. Over the course of the year we have gone through various passages of scripture that are connected either with the worship set or the message.

Discipleship:

Throughout the year I have had the opportunity to meet consistently with a number of the worship team members for accountability, prayer, and encouragement. I am so thankful for the time spent growing in relationship with our music team members. Jim Hans has been a tremendous help behind the scenes in helping with technical needs in addition to his participation on the worship team. Our time of discipleship and prayer or simply encouraging each other has been a huge blessing as we grow and learn together.

It is awesome to see what God is doing in the lives of some of our praise team members. One example is the Haycock camp ministry in Kitners-ville, PA. I had the opportunity twice last summer to go to Camp Haycock see the camp and also teach the campers from God's word. It was a really neat experience because we have Max & Jen Whylings, Dave "Doc" Langus, and Keith Marks who are all heavily involved in ministry at Haycock and they actively serve in multiple roles, one of which is the music here at Ebenezer.

Sound Room & Simulcast:

Our Sunday services have been live on the web for over a year now. It has been really working well with some minor hiccups along the way, based on working within the network and training of the operators. We have a group that comes in early on Sunday morning and makes sure that all of our video tech is in place and ready to go every Sunday. I am so thankful for Ken Stanley, Bob Beebe, and Jason Lee as well as the rest of the team members. I know Jason has been on call and has put many hours behind the scenes to make sure that everything is done efficiently and effectively.

I have also been helping with sound needs for a number of funerals and weddings, as needed. I was involved in the sound room, teamed up with Jason, during the Veteran's service, and Henri is planning the simulcast event with Harvest America.

New Worship Team Members:

This year we have had the privilege of adding some wonderfully talented singers and musicians. When bringing in new members we evaluate their walk with the Lord that they are actively growing in the fullness of God's grace and truth. They also need to play music or sing with excellence.

We have added Nate Gore on the acoustic guitar/bass and his wife, Emily, has also helped with music for our corporate prayer night. I have had the joy of meeting with Nate and enjoy growing with his whole family in our new kinship group. We have also added Justen Blackstone on piano and vocals and his wife, Olivia, will be helping with singing on the worship team in 2017. Justen and Olivia are also part of our kinship group and we have enjoyed growing in relationship with them. Jen Whylings continues to be involved in various areas of music ministry with her, now husband, Max Whylings who continues with drums and other music roles as needed.

Special Worship Services & Events:

- 1) <u>Easter Services</u> Nicole and John Huie helped lead the Easter choir and did a great job!
- 2) <u>Christmas & Christmas Eve Services</u> There was a lot of time that many musicians put into making our music possible.
- 3) <u>Adult and Children's Choir</u> This year Ashley Morrin and Bethany Randall helped lead our adult choir and Karris Pennington started a children's choir. Both did a wonderful job ministering to the church body through music.

- 4) Prayer Night I have helped with preparing and leading in music for the corporate prayer night which began the end of October.
- 5) <u>Picnic</u> We also had a worship "Thank You" party at the Heric's home in September. This was simply a time to show our appreciation to all those who are serving the Lord in the music ministry at Ebenezer.

<u>Future Plans</u>

I have really been processing and praying about ways to take our worship ministry outside the walls of Ebenezer. Ministry through music is powerful and I'm really praying that the Lord would provide some opportunities this year for that to happen.

2. College Age Ministry

The focus of College age shepherding is to continue to make disciples. This is done by taking advantage of the time throughout the year to be intentional in their lives, read & mutually challenge each other in God's word, and develop goals to help them grow. During 2016 this took place by meeting regularly at our home and us trying to keep in contact. Whether this was through texts, calls, or meeting in person, our main goal was to help equip them in living out God's word in their day to day activities. We finished "Gospel In Life" curriculum near the end of the year. We then continued to simply have times of fellowship and challenging them to live out the gospel in their practical living.

We have added Dan and Candace Trafford as leaders and they have been a wonderful compliment to the team of Adam and Jess Whitmer and Lindsay and I. I have really been overjoyed at what God is doing in the individual lives of our students. College ministry has its challenges being that most are out of state and regular get-togethers are not possible. But we have been seeing anywhere from 6 to 8 regular students, who are local and seeking fellowship and community.

This year I wanted to make an opportunity for Keith Marks to be plugged into an ongoing discipleship relationship with a friend named Mike, who we met at the Harvest America outreach last year. Throughout 2016 Keith, myself, and Mike would meet to go through God's word, pray, and exercise together. God has really blessed our time together and I look forward to seeing how it progresses in 2017.

Vision & Goals

A new part of our vision for College age ministry has been to focus our efforts on Sunday mornings. We began meeting every Sunday morning during Sunday school hour for a casual time of fellowship and discussing an article or passage of scripture. There have been many good interactions and it seems to be a good alternative for students who are unable to make it to our College Kinship group to fellowship with each other. Adam Whitmer & Dan Trafford are leading this time and are doing an excellent job unpacking different passages of scripture as well as creating an environment where controversial and pressing topics can be discussed in a safe way. The students are always encouraged to measure everything against the Word of God.

Between Lindsay and me, we have been discipling 16 college age individuals on a regular basis. We continue to send out emails and texts to our college students asking for updates, praises, and prayer requests going on in their lives. Please pray for these young men and women for true intimacy with Christ and a Holy fear of God as we continue to grow and groan with them and help in equipping and teaching them on living out their faith. Lindsay and I will also begin pre-marital counseling with a couple from our group.

We had a campfire/pool party at the Herics in late August where both the college age and youth were invited to come and get to know each other better. During the camp-fire time Mark Culton and I led in music and encouraged the college students to share with those in senior high what the Lord was teaching them.

One of the most important areas to grow in is continuing to meet each young person where they are at. We seek to encourage and challenge them for deeper intimacy with Christ, how we should function in the body of Christ, and loving one another and our neighbor as ourselves (Matt. 22:34-40). These three goals are what Lindsay and I want to continue to help these young people understand and embrace.

Additional Ministry Activities:

- 1) <u>VBS Leadership</u> Once again, John Huie and Cheryl Hutchinson lead the worship for VBS week and they did an excellent job engaging the kids with music and drama that carried the gospel message in a simple fashion.
- 2) <u>LITC</u> Can I just say what a tremendous job Mark and Jen Culton did in being obedient to the Holy Spirit's calling to cultivate authentic relationships with the community of families in Lynnfield. In my 2 years of being involved in Light In the City it has been a joy to be a part of solid biblical teaching and growing in community with a diverse group of people. It was a joy to teach with Pastor Mark with the high schooler's last summer. It was also wonderful partnering with him in spending time with the high schoolers and their families during our 3 outreach events to this community our church supported over the summer. These events helped the kids take summer field trips and gave us opportunities to share in their lives and speak truth to them.
- 3) <u>Visitation</u> I have had the opportunity, on a number of occasions, to visit those who are in the hospital and pray and encourage them in the midst of physical or mental hardship. It has been a joy to grow in relationship with our church people as we lay the burdens down at the feet of Jesus.

Future Plans:

- 1) Multiply in Discipleship: Encourage those who are being discipled to disciple others and provide tangible ways for this to happen.
- 2) Church Integration: We have a number of young people in our two Sunday services. Our goal will be, and has been, to target those who are college age (18-24) and really be intentional in getting to know them and get them plugged in.

Board of Elders

"So I exhort the elders among you, as a fellow elder and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, as well as a partaker in the glory that is going to be revealed: shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising oversight, not under compulsion, but willingly, as God would have you; not for shameful gain, but eagerly; not domineering over those in your charge, but being examples to the flock. And when the chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the unfading crown of glory." 1 Peter 5:1-4

Being a Shepherd of the local church is a very rewarding and yet difficult & sobering task. One of the main emphases that we stress in all our Elder meetings is the dependency on the Chief Shepherd. We all understand that this flock of Ebenezer is the Lord's flock. We also understand that our abilities are limited, and we desperately need the wisdom of the Lord and His guidance to make the wisest decisions for our congregation. Sometimes practicality gets in the way of walking by faith. But for the most part our hearts' desire is to make decisions based on how we feel the Holy Spirit is leading us.

Faithfulness to the Lord is what drives us as an Elder board. We know that we are going to give an account to the Lord, so we want to please Him first and foremost. As a result prayer has become a major part of our meetings. Each week, we have a brief leadership discussion and then spend 40 minutes or more in prayer for our congregation. Each elder has a list of congregants, which they are responsible to shepherd. We spend time praying for each of them at every meeting.

2016 has provided us with several challenges. One of the major challenges we face each year is guarding the flock. Sound teaching is vital for a healthy church. As Elders we take our responsibility of protecting the flock very seriously. For this reason, we spent a great deal of time talking about popular teachers. Beth Moore came up again this year. It was the conclusion of the Elder board not to endorse Beth Moore's teaching for an extended time, due to some concerns that we have about her continual associations with Joel Osteen and Joyce Meyer, whom we deem dangerous to the Church.

Overseeing ministries in the congregation is also a major concern. We long for every ministry to be a vital part of helping develop mature believers in Christ. The Elders worked through how to make the senior adult ministry (Prime Timers) a viable ministry. We are very thankful for the service of many volunteer leaders over the years. However, in 2016 many of those leaders stepped down for multiple reasons, mainly due to burn out. The Elders asked Phil Norris with the help of John Meade to oversee that ministry. The music/worship ministry was also evaluated early on in the year. The Elders gave Jeremy a few directives to which he was willing to make.

Policies are always difficult to construct and put into place. However, this year was the year of policies. The Elders approved several polices this year including the following. All of these policies have been posted online. We are asking all the church procedures to follow these policies.

- Facility Use
- Gift Acceptance
- Whistle Blower
- Conflict of Interest
- Fundraising
- Indemnification of Elders, Deacons, Officers, Employees & Agents
- Delinquent members

Church discipline is also a major heartbreak for Elders. This year the Elder board spent a great deal of time praying for and trying to work through how to best shepherd wayward members. The discipline process is not entered into quickly or haphazardly. We spend a great deal of time trying to understand and work through issues with people before we jump to the discipline process. However when hearts are hard and refuse to repent of what the Elders believe to be a clear command in Scripture, then we must move forward with Matthew 18, & 1 Corinthians 5. This year we performed discipline on one individual for living in fornication and are in the process of administering discipline to another couple for an unbiblical divorce and failure to follow the instruction of Ephesians 5:22-33.

Once again, the budget construction for 2017 was somewhat of a challenge. There is always a struggle on the Elder board between stewardship and faithfulness. While we understand that these are not mutually exclusive, there is a spirit of putting our faith and hope in God to provide for the future. God has provided Ebenezer with a very nice savings account, and the majority of the Elders feel like that money is there to be used for ministry if needed. So while not unanimous, the majority of the elders voted

to adopt a budget that was the same as 2016 even though we did not meet that budget in 2016. However, it should be noted that the Elders gave praise to God because our ministry did not overspend. While the 2016 income was under budget, it was sufficient to cover all of the spending, which was also under budget. This resulted in an \$18,851 surplus at the end of the year. So the 2017 budget remained the same for the most part. And in the event that we must draw money from savings we are prepared to do so. If the disparity begins to increase through the year, the Elders are always prepared to take a serious look at what needs to change in order to remain good stewards.

The following congregational meetings were held:

- Annual Congregational Meeting January 31
- Semi-Annual Congregational Meeting July 17
- Congregational Budget Meeting December 11

We continue to consider how to train new elders and discover who in the congregation has been called to be an Elder. This year several elders were re-elected. I praise the Lord for the faithfulness and stability of many of our long term elders. One new Elder will be added in 2017, Phil Norris. Phil had served in other BFC Churches over the past decade. We are thrilled to have him on our board.

One bittersweet development in 2016 was the resignation of Mark Culton our Youth Pastor. After eight wonderful years of ministry here, Mark was called to serve the Lord as a Senior Pastor at Bethel Church in Northwest Indiana. We are so thankful for Mark's contribution to our ministry here. We are going to miss him and his family greatly. However, we know that the Lord is going to raise up another man to serve our students here at EBFC. The Elders approved a search committee to begin searching for a new Youth Pastor. Pastor Dick Bickings agreed to chair that committee.

We also said goodbye (hopefully for just a season) to Andy Brimer who has served on our Elder board as the Treasurer for many years. We are so thankful for his faithful service. He is rotating off and will focus his ministry in different areas at Ebenezer. We are praying for his replacement.

Overall, the Elder board worked very well together. We have a sweet spirit of unity among the 14 Elders, which is truly a work of God. We strive for unanimity, but at times find disagreement among the group. However, this disagreement is always met with humility and gentleness and submission to the group as a whole. We each truly guard our hearts, as we know pride can creep in at any moment. We instituted a code of conduct (pirate's code) this year so that unstated attitudes and actions would not be vague and imprecise. Each of the Elders agreed that the code was needed and served as a great reminder of how we must function on the board as Elders. We pray that the Lord will continue to allow us to shepherd the flock of God at Ebenezer with excellence. Please continually pray for your leaders.

On the sports end of this committee we have an organized softball team and a dart baseball team. This year we have continued our partnership with Athletes for the Cross through kid's soccer and basketball programs. We saw as many as 100 kids participate and about 1/3 of them were from the community. The ladies ZUMBA fitness classes are continuing as well for now on Monday and Thursday nights. Coming in 2017 we will be phasing out the Zumba program and introducing an all-around women's cardio dance fitness that will offer different types of training for ladies that are at different levels of fitness. All of these programs are designed to have an emphasis not only on physical strengthening and sport knowledge but spiritual growth as well. We look forward to these programs growing and the impact on the lives they are touching.

Children's Ministry: Kids Crossing

Discipleship Ministry

Awana:

We are in our fourth year of the AWANA program at Ebenezer. So far it has been a great year of teaching the Word of God to the children, and helping them to memorize scripture. AWANA stands for "approved workmen are not ashamed", and that is our goal each Wednesday night. We want to teach and develop children to be obedient and confident followers of Christ.

AWANA meets Wednesday nights during the school year, 6:30-8:00 pm. The program is available for children ages birth through 5th grade. We are so pleased this year to provide a nursery and Puggles class for birth through 2 years of age. We average 60 kids each week this year in AWANA, and God has provided us with approximately 38 leaders. This is an answer to prayer as it takes many leaders to successfully run the program and give the kids the teaching and assistance they need. The kids in AWANA will memorize and recite approximately 2000 verses this year. Praise the Lord!

We are grateful to the Elders of Ebenezer for teaching the children each Wednesday night. This is done on a rotating schedule and is a wonderful opportunity for the kids to not only hear the Word of God taught, but to get to know the Elders on a more personal level. AWANA provides the Elders with a curriculum and PowerPoint to use in teaching the lessons.

I am continually thankful for Pastor Dick and Rachel Marks for all of their assistance, help and support in leading this ministry. Furthermore, we are so blessed with wonderful leaders in the nursery, secretaries, game leaders, Cubbies workers, Sparks leaders and T&T leaders. Bible Memory Program:

The Bible Memory Program's goal is to encourage and motivate students in Kindergarten through eighth grade to memorize the Word of God so that they will carry it with them the rest of their lives. The program is open to students who attend Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church's Sunday School. The program took place January 24 through May 15, 2016.

This year saw an increase in the number of participants in the program. 21 children successfully completed the Bible Memory Program. This year we offered the children an additional option for their award. They were able to choose from a Hackman's gift certificate, a Christianbook.com gift certificate (new this year), or a partial camp scholarship. 6 of the children chose the \$35 Hackman's Bible Book Store gift certificate as their award. 8 of the children chose the Christianbook.com gift certificate. 1 chose the \$70 camp scholarship to Explorer Girls' Camp and 6 chose the \$70 camp scholarship to Victory Valley Camp. 11 of the children participating earned an extra bonus (\$10 Hackman's gift certificate) by memorizing the books of the Bible and reciting them to us.

The program ministered to 14 families in the church. We are encouraged to hear how this program affects not only the students memorizing the Word, but also the families involved. There are several families who have been faithful over the years to be involved and have their children complete the program. This year we had some new families involved as well. It is our hope and prayer that in the coming year there will be an even greater participation of families and more children to "hide God's word" (Psalm 119:11) in their hearts.

Security

The purpose of this committee is to address current trends of violence occurring at houses of worship so that Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church can better fulfill its Purpose:

"to worship God with our whole heart; build believers with the Word of God; and reach the lost with the Good News."

Paul, in his epistle to Romans, tells us that although we are one body in Christ, we have many members, each with different gifts according to His Grace. God continues to bless Ebenezer Bible Fellowship with many individuals (Security Team) who have shown an interest in providing a safe and secure environment for the congregation. During the previous 5-year period, the trend of violence directed at places of worship has grown, on average, 17% each year. The Security Committee monitors these trends and enacts measures to mitigate them. If you are interested in joining the Security Team, please reach out to me or one of the members of the Security Committee: Tom Galloway, Blake Kuntz, or Leroy Marsh.

Fire/Safety

The purpose of Fire/Safety is to ensure that the members and ministries of the church are aware of the evacuation procedures in the event of an emergency. This includes posting evacuation routes throughout the church and periodic fire drill training. In the event of an emergency during Sunday services, follow the instructions of the ushers.

Medical

A team of skilled medical individuals from our congregation comprises a First Aid Responder Team that is available to render emergency medical aid at Ebenezer. We also have First Aid Stations located in the Nursery, Kitchen and on the coat racks in the lobby and near the gym. These medical boxes are inspected & stocked periodically throughout the year and are available to the congregation for its use.

Evangelism

Elder Ministry

As you know our aim for the Evangelism 318 Ministry is to support our vision of being "reaching arms for the gospel".

The Evangelism 318 reference comes from Genesis 14:14:

When Abram heard that his kinsman had been taken captive, he led forth his trained men, born in his house, 318 of them, and went in pursuit as far as Dan.

Prior to our salvation we are all captives of sin. It is our desire to have compassion for those in captivity, to have a passion for pursuing them, and to be trained and equipped to fulfill the Great Commission. We understand that it is the work of the Holy Spirit that saves, but we want to be equipped to be used by the Holy Spirit.

Pray also for me, that whenever I open my mouth, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it fearlessly, as I should. ~ Ephesians 6:19-20

To that end, we are on a mission to build our own team of 318 kinsmen, trained, equipped, and confident in pursuit of those in captivity.

Highlights & Resources in 2016

Resources

- Approximately half of our resources are spent on ensuring supplies are available to aid our saints in sharing the gospel:
 - ♦ Tracts
 - ♦ Bibles
 - ♦ Invitation Cards.
- The remainder of the budget supports events, training, and community outreach

Events

- <u>Harvest America</u> In March, Ebenezer hosted Harvest America which was a live concert simulcast from Texas Stadium featuring
 top Christian music artists, and a gospel message was also presented. Over 200 people attended, mostly non-Ebenezer
 members as the focus was to "draw in" non-believers invited by our membership. It was exciting to see several come forward
 to be prayed over and to receive Gospel of John handouts. Steve Leaser's tireless leadership ensured a successful event. Special
 thanks also go out to Pastor Jeremy and Henri Darby who provided technology support.
- 318 Training Sessions
 - We offered four Saturday morning training events where we trained on the fundamentals of sharing the gospel using The Way of Master curriculum, produced by Ray Comfort.
 - In December Pastor Franklin Meyer conducted a workshop at Ebenezer. Level 1: Beginning with Tracts, this training focused on utilization of appropriate tracts to share one's faith, the importance of setting and pursuing personal goals for evangelism and the importance of prayer.
- <u>Candy Carnival</u> was held at Ebenezer in October as an alternative to traditional Halloween celebrations and as a means to bringing people from our community into our church building.

Community Outreach

- In addition to Harvest America at Ebenezer, Pastor Mark hosted a simulcast of the event at the Lynnfield Community Center.
- The Cultons & youth group continued to have active outreach and relationship building at Lynnfield Community Center through
 Light in the City and a series of summer "field trips" that were sponsored and hosted by Ebenezer saints, with funding coming
 out of the Evangelism budget.
- Outdoor Worship Service
- Salute to Veteran's Service
- 11,000 Invitation Cards were mailed to the surrounding Bethlehem community in advance of Easter services inviting people to worship with Ebenezer on Easter Sunday
- Adult Elective A 12-week, Way of the Master Adult Elective Class was offered during the summer
- A special praise for Matt Edmonds who faithfully leads a small group of men and women over to Staten Island Ferry for open air preaching and dissemination of bibles and tracts. A handful of Ebenezer saints have been blessed by accompanying Matt. This has inspired us to evaluate how we can do similar activities within our own community in Bethlehem.

- Established Monthly 318 Meetings: open to all (1 hour)
 - ♦ Prayer
 - ♦ Encouragement and Testimonies
 - ♦ Accountability: "what's your evangelistic temperature?" Setting personal goals for evangelism.

Please continue to pray for this ministry. I also ask you to reflect on "what your evangelistic temperature is?" In 2017 we'd love to see you frequent our monthly meetings, to be moved by the Spirit to set personal goals for evangelism and to be reaching arms for the Gospel.

Finance

Elder Ministry

The General Fund income for the year totaled \$972,776 (98% of our targeted annual projected income budget amount of \$988,671). Total spending was \$952,809 (96% of projected expenses).

EBFC's overall financial status throughout 2016 was guarded and we have an optimistic outlook for 2017. Total Cash & Cash Equivalent Assets increased by about \$22,212 to \$707,675, which includes \$174,085 in Designated Funds. The increase can be primarily attributed to spending less than the budget projections; however, the 2016 income received was greater than the expenses.

An LPL Financial account was set up as an additional way for individuals to donate essentially anything that is publicly traded, e.g., stocks, bonds, ETFs, and mutual funds.

Thanks to those who served on the Finance Committee in 2016 – Margie Cruz, Debbie Griffin, Byron Roth and Dale Tshudy.

Final thanks go to the unseen yet important work of the Audit Team - Rachael Kuntz, Dale Tshudy, Gail Tshudy and Marge Harris. They reviewed specific aspects of our financial procedures. An external firm RLB Accountants has been engaged to conduct a verification of EBFC's financials for 2016.

Let us prayerfully seek how we worship through our giving and continue to be good stewards in building His Kingdom.




2016 Income vs Expenses



The purpose of the Kinship program is for each group to be a microcosm of Ebenezer Church. Kinship groups provide smaller informal gatherings for growing in our faith, and spending time in fellowship with one another. Our goals are to nurture, fellowship, worship, care, train, serve, and grow in the knowledge of God. Kinship strives to take various people with different experiences and backgrounds and assimilate them into one body and one faith. In 2016, our Lord has continued to bless and move this program forward in such a powerful way. We focused our efforts this past year around the key areas below:

- To inform the congregation how important it is to be part of a Kinship group through a Ministry Moment in August, and to assimilate all those interested into appropriate groups.
- To raise up new Kinship group leaders, as needed.
- To develop more Kinship group leaders from within existing groups.
- To assist current leaders by meeting one-on-one with them on an annual basis.
- To update the "Small Group Leader Ministry Description" and "Kinship Resource List," and distribute to all leaders.

This past year, the Lord blessed the program with increased Kinship leadership, and increased participation. We added one new leader, Matt Zmarzley. Our groups assimilated 37 "new" adults and 15 children over this past year. We did, however, lose a number of people due to various reasons (life changes, moving away, death, etc.). Bob was able to meet one-on-one with each Kinship leader, which was a big help in communicating with the leaders and assessing their needs. We met the challenges that came our way in 2016 with increased leadership, an additional group, and more participation! We praise the Lord for his provisions! Amen!! Membership and Discipline

Elder Ministry

We thank the Lord that 2016 was another year for many to seek membership in our church. We held 4 membership classes throughout the year with approximately 54 in attendance.

- 420 Members as of 12/31/16
- 511 Average Sunday Attendance for 2016 (including children)

- 333 First-Time Visitors
- 106 Visitor Letters Sent

This brings our membership total to 422 at the end of 2016. Loss in membership is mainly due to deaths (4), church discipline (1), moved away (10), transferred to another church (6), or doctrinal reason for withdrawing membership (1). Overall, 44 new members is an 11 % increase in 2016. Many who are coming are excited about our biblical convictions, expository preaching, and biblical ministry philosophy. Our goal at Ebenezer is to be faithful to God and His Word rather than use gimmicks and a man-centered approach to build our numbers. I feel blessed that God has brought so many new people to our Church. We are committed to remain faithful to our Lord knowing that while we are planting, and watering, it is God alone who gives the increase (1 Corinthians 3:6-8).

As an Elder board we are committed to the Bible and the procedures laid out in the Bible concerning membership. We encouraged many within our congregation who are faithful attendees to become members. Furthermore, the Elder board is committed to Church discipline as laid out by our Lord in Matthew 18. The Church discipline process is certainly not a popular procedure in our market driven culture. However, we are striving to remain faithful to the process that Jesus laid out. One individual was dropped from the role due to the lack of repentance when confronted concerning sexual immorality. There was much effort to exhort this individual to repent of sin and turn back to the Lord. However, our exhortations did not prove fruitful. The individual was presented to the Church at our July business meeting. We continue to pray for those who once "worshiped" among us but have left showing that they were not really "of us" (1 John 2:19). While they may have sprung up in joy, their apostasy has shown that they may not be true converts (Mark 4:1-20).

It has been difficult knowing how to proceed with delinquent members. Policy in the past has simply dropped all members who have not attended in a one-year period. However, the Elder board adopted a new policy in 2016 that would put delinquent members on a formal "Care List." Because we truly care about the souls of our church members, this care list will be presented to the congregation at each business meeting in January and in July. Faithful members will be asked to contact and pray for these members who have been absent in hopes that we can help them faithfully attend worship with us. If after one year the member has still not attended, and after Pastors have attempted to contact them, they will be dropped from the formal membership role.

The Elders continue to keep watch over the flock here in Bethlehem. Each of our 14 Elders has been given a group of members and attendees to keep in contact. It is our heart's desire to provide pastoral care to every attendee of Ebenezer, in hopes that we all will produce fruit in keeping with repentance (Matt 3:8) and continue to persevere in faith, love and holiness giving evidence of the regenerating work of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

The Men's Ministry exits primarily to disciple men to become devoted followers of Jesus Christ. In order to do this we focus our efforts on training men how to be the godly leaders and examples that Christ commanded in their homes, jobs, society, and church. This training is done in the following ways:

- <u>Bible Studies</u> Weekly Men's bible studies were held throughout 2016:
 - ♦ Tuesday evenings "The Bethel Series" (for men & women), taught by Jason Lee
 - ♦ Thursday mornings 6:15 am, taught/facilitated by various men in the group
 - ♦ Thursday mornings 9:00 am, taught/facilitated by various men in the group
- <u>Prayer Group</u> a Saturday morning group set aside specifically for men to get together and pray...for the homes, marriages, children, wives, church, country, etc. We began with a passage of scripture (usually the Psalms), and used it as a pattern to pray.
- Breakfasts Well-attended men's breakfasts were held quarterly, providing fellowship, teaching, worship time, and prayer. A faithful crew of men cooked (directed by Bob Guadagnino) and set up (directed by Jim Travisano) for this event very early each Saturday morning. We also were privileged to have Mark Florentine fill in when Bob had to work. The worship time was led by, Dan Hutchinson or Pastor Jeremy Harkins. The theme of this year's teaching time was entitled "What is a Disciple?" which looked at four characteristics that define discipleship, "one who is called", "one who counts the cost", "one who is commissioned", and "one who is crowned."
- <u>Community/Church Outreach</u> The men were called upon frequently throughout the year to lend a hand whether it was for someone who was moving, or some other physical labor.

Praise the Lord for providing an excellent men's leadership team to provide ideas and implement plans to keep this vital ministry on track.

There are different kinds of spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit is the source of them all. 5 There are different kinds of service, but we serve the same Lord. 6 God works in different ways, but it is the same God who does the work in all of us. 1 Cor. 12:4-6

As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace. 1 Peter 4:10

It is continually humbling to be reminded that God has graciously chosen to use us for His work. **1 Peter 2:5** says, You yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. Only believers become a holy priesthood: clothed with Christ's righteousness and **equipped for service!** In other words, we have been **SAVED TO SERVE!**

God has richly blessed us with many ministry opportunities here at Ebenezer. Although we may be tempted to "jump in" to help fill specific ministry needs that arise, I believe there is a more biblical approach to serving. **The vision of ministry assimilation** is to help equip believers to be effective stewards of the unique God-given passions and gifts given to each of us through God's varied grace. This enables us to be most effective in serving God for His glory and edifying others.

For those who aren't familiar with what's been going on during the assimilation process this past year, it involves 3 main steps:

- 1) The Saved to Serve Networking class (typically four, 2-hour sessions) which helps equip you for biblical service while working through your God-given passion, spiritual gift(s), and unique personality profile.
- 2) After completing the class, there is a one-on-one consultation which is designed to assist you in finding a meaningful place of service according to your ministry fit.
- 3) Lord willing, the result should be meaningful service and character development being transformed by Christ while serving for His Glory and edifying others!

We went through this process twice this year – once in the spring on Sunday afternoons and again this past fall on Wednesday nights. We were blessed to work with roughly 20 individuals, many of whom are already faithfully serving. In addition to the formal times, I have been continually working through this process one-on-one with individuals during the Sunday School hour. I was also able to take time this year to design some Saved to Serve promotional pieces to help strengthen the awareness and importance of ministry assimilation.

Some goals for 2017 would include:

- 1) Continue to be closely involved with plugging Networking and providing a brief teaching moment during the membership classes throughout the year. I have found face to face discussion with individuals really helps get the conversation going about effectively serving at Ebenezer.
- 2) Connect and follow-up with previous participants to check-in/encourage them as they seek to be faithful in serving.
- 3) To reflect on ways to improve in this ministry with the elders and prayerfully consider how to best live out Ephesians 4:11-13 seeking to strategically and effectively equip and spur on our local church body to do ministry.

Please speak with me if you're interested in working through the assimilation process and also pray that we, as a church body, would be faithful in living out **Hebrews 10:24-25** "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works. Not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."

Thanks to, Andy Brimer, Jacque' Prebula, and Kristie Hard, for helping out with the one-on-one consultations throughout the year.

Women's Ministry

MOPS (Mothers of Preschoolers)/ MomsNext is doing great for the 2016-17 year! Our theme is "We are the Starry Eyed" and our theme verse is "Thus says The Lord who made the earth, The Lord who formed it to establish it ... Call to me and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know". – Jeremiah 33:2-3.

We've hosted several events so far this year; Kickoff in September which was held at Louise Moore Park started it off. We have twice monthly meetings on the first and third Thursday mornings, with such topics as financial and will planning, teaching science to our kids, astronomy, Bible journaling, couponing, and our Christmas brunch. Our steering committee meets once a month to discuss and plan upcoming meetings and Mom's Nights Out.

We have had a huge interest in MOPS/MomsNext this year, with 39 moms involved as participants, 13 of whom are EBFC members; 7 mentor moms (5 are members), 24 Moppets helpers, and 70 children in the Moppets program (this is double the number in our Moppets program last year!)

One new direction we've taken this year has been inviting all moms of children up through high school age and starting the "MomsNext" part of our group. Inviting moms of older kids has brought in several new moms to our group and we're excited about where this will take us in the future!

Our ministry has impacted the moms of preschoolers and older kids both in our church and in the community by supporting and encouraging these moms at a wonderful but sometimes hard time in their lives. We provide a safe place for moms to catch up with other women going through the same things as them, both good and bad. MOPS has helped many women find friends and mentors who can be "helping hands" to other moms. We encourage moms in their spiritual lives as well, with devotionals and prayer each meeting, and discussion group leaders and mentor moms who are strong in their faith and can be available to the moms when needed.

Our service project this year included collecting for and distributing baskets full of Thanksgiving food for the Salvation Army. We also collected over \$130 to use for grocery gift cards to place in the baskets. One of our moms was at the drop-off location and got to meet a grandmother who received one of our baskets the week before Thanksgiving. It was a huge blessing to be able to witness the outcome of our service project!

- Repaired the lawn in two areas that were damaged from snow removal and the new roof installation for the sanctuary
- Continue to monitor the test strip of caulking with backer rods we did to try and save the gym roof for longer tern use. So far it looks good but last winter was mild.
- Replaced the church library HVAC unit.
- Replaced the HVAC unit for rooms 10-11

Planned projects for 2017:

- We are planning on doing a major repair to the large cracked areas of the parking lot and driveway. This will include digging up some areas and replacing the blacktop.
- Replacing the sewage pipe from the back of the church in the playground area out to the connection near the flower bed
 on the west end of the church. We need to do this to fix a low area that repeatedly blocked up and also improve the pitch
 in the line to prevent further blockages. This repair started the end of 2016 but turned into a much bigger than expected
 project and is still in the process as of this writing.
- Replacing both of the HVAC units for the sanctuary which are old and leaking freon.

Long term capital projects may include:

- Some of the first 4 projects listed may be funded out of our building fund and done in 2017.
- Replace the lighting in the sanctuary, foyer, and fellowship hall,
- replace the flooring in the lobby and foyer area,
- replace or repair the fellowship hall roof,
- expand the parking lot when needed.
- Replacement of the original windows on the east side of the lobby and nursery area and also the north side of the building BCS library and classrooms 4-5.
- At some time in the future we would like to add more security cameras to cover the parking lots at both the side and rear entrances to the church. This was requested by the school and they offered to help pay for them.

We greatly appreciate all those who signed up to take care of the various flowerbeds. It was a tremendous help and they looked great.

I would like to thank the volunteers who helped Kevin Kritzberger and the Property Committee throughout the year with the many hours of donated labor to help maintain and improve our building and grounds.

I would like to add a special thank you to Lisa Pyles who has spent many hours over the past several years seasonally decorating the inside of our church.

I would also like to thank the committee members who served with me this year on the Property Committee. It was a pleasure working with you and I look forward to serving with you again on the committee for 2017. Property committee members: George Hardy, Kevin Kritzberger, Otis Powell, and Wayne Batten.

Technology

Property Committee Ministry

<u>Purpose:</u> The Technology Team is charged with planning, purchasing, installing, and maintaining the IT (Information Technology) systems at Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church.

<u>Responsibilities:</u> Our team is responsible for supporting the Church Staff with the tools they need to serve the Lord and His church with the most efficient, reliable, and secure systems possible. These responsibilities include:

- Hardware and software support for nearly 20 workstations
- Maintaining a server network, wireless network, and internet connections
- Web Site www.aplaceforyou.org
- Troubleshooting and problem solving
- Technology planning for the evolving needs of a modern church
- Coordinating infrastructure planning & maintenance with the Worship team, the Simulcast/Streaming teams, Adult Electives, and the shared resources with BCS

2016 Achievements Included:

- 1) Continued improvements to our IT infrastructure:
 - ♦ Updating systems to 1 gigabit components
 - ♦ Modifying & relocating wireless access points to improve connectivity and speed
 - Resolving Wireless connectivity issues with BCS; relocation of one WAP (Wireless Access Point) & installation of an additional WAP in the BCS office
 - Re-configured router and coordinated resources for a seamless installation of the new digital phone system shared by EBFC & BCS
 - Coordinated pricing & renewal of licenses for BCS' Cisco Meraki router and associated WAPs, which provide WLAN and LAN access for both BCS and EBFC (BCS graciously subsidized the entire cost of the three year subscription renewal in the amount of \$2,726)
 - Purchase & deployment of a new QNAP Cloud NAS, providing remote accessible storage to staff, curriculum & content sharing with Kids Crossing teachers, and simultaneous streaming of curriculum videos for Children's Church, Sunday School, Awana, etc., to individual SmartBoards/devices
 - Negotiated "Bundle Pricing" for EBFC phone service with RCN, which now also provides a significantly faster internet connection
- 2) Updating software:
 - ♦ Upgraded Library software to latest version
 - Church database Remained current with FileMaker, converted to on-site hosting
 - New subscription to Comodo Internet Security
 - ♦ Began upgrading to Office 2016
- 3) New PCs or Laptops were provided for the following positions:
 - ♦ Pastor of Discipleship Replacement upgrade to refurbished 2015 Macbook Pro
 - ♦ Copy Room PC Upgraded with a newer donated PC
 - ♦ Library PC Upgraded with a new PC

Transportation Committee

Deacon Ministry

Number of trips (use frequency) of the church vehicles in 2016 was equivalent to use in 2015; the number of rental vans required in 2016 also remained the same. Rental vehicles are used (in addition to EBFC's vehicles) when the ministry is in need of transportation which requires more seating than EBFC's vehicles provide, and or when it is impractical for multiple volunteers' vehicles to be driven.

Mini-Bus [2008 Ford E-350 Super Duty XLT Omnibus, by ElDorado National]:

- July: one (of two) front left ball joint was determined (during annual State Inspection) to be in need of replacement; both left ball joints were replaced to save on labor, and also due to the second joint showing moderate signs of wear/dry rot. The front brake pads were also replaced the pads were deteriorated and had separated from the pad backing.
- July 23: while departing Gifford Pinchot State Park to return to Ebenezer (Student Ministries camping 'Kickback'), the bus was side swiped by small passenger car. The left rear section of the bus was scuffed and had minor cosmetic damage around the wheel well; and the left rear side marker light was torn from the light housing. Insurance and driver information was obtained, and the other driver was found at fault. I acquired an estimate for the repairs, and EBFC received compensation from the insurance of the at fault driver. The committee decided to complete the repairs 'in house' the side marker light was replaced, and the minor cosmetic damage will be repaired at a future date.
- August: Just prior to picking up a missions team from the airport (LVIA/ABE), the upper radiator hose ruptured and a significant amount of engine coolant leaked out; after allowing it to cool and adding more coolant, the bus was driven to Mavis Discount Tire (previously STS) in Nazareth, PA for repair.

Van [2011 Ford E-350 Super Duty XLT]:

- April 15: while in Washington, D.C. (youth Dare 2 Share conference) the church van and a 12-passenger Budget Rental van
 were broken into multiple suitcases were stolen (8 students/staff were affected); total estimated value of property
 stolen was \$3,100. At the time, the vehicles were parked at the public parking near the monuments. The police were
 called, and all necessary information and police case number were provided to our insurance. The theft damage to EBFC's
 van was repaired by Bethlehem Ford:
 - ♦ Rear door key/lock cylinder replaced
 - Rear door license plate and handle/latch plate
 - ♦ Total cost: \$537
