"I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." 2 Timothy 4:1-5

As a servant of the Lord my greatest task is "preaching the Word." I tremble when I think about standing one day before the Lord and giving an account of how well I "fulfilled my ministry." There is always going to be the temptation to preach messages that are lukewarm and void of deep spiritual truth, deep theology and exhortation to holiness. The vision of Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a weekly diet of expository preaching. We believe that this is what makes a healthy church and truly "grows the saints" and fulfills our vision. And because we believe that the whole Bible is the Word of God we also include teaching from the Old Testament. 2017 was a year focused on the Old Testament. A majority of the time was spent in expositing the ancient foundations of our faith from the book of Genesis. We finished up 2016 with 2 Peter. We had previously exposited the first 24 chapters of Genesis so we picked up where we left off studying the life of the Patriarchs. We divided the narrative of chapters 25-50 into two series: "Walking with the Patriarchs" (25-36) and "Joseph: The Story of Divine Providence" (37-50).

Another major theme of this year's preaching was the 500th anniversary of the Reformation on October 31, 1517. I took the opportunity to celebrate this occasion by preaching through the major development of the recovery of the Gospel. I preached through the 5 Solas that theologians believe were the core of the Reformation: Sola Scriptura, Sola Fide, Sola Gratia, Solus Christus, & Soli De Gloria. Since there were five Sundays in October, we took the whole month to celebrate. I felt it was vitally important for our flock to realize why we believe what we believe. I attempted to go back to the Scripture in each sermon and contrast how we differ from Roman Catholicism. The whole celebration was kicked off by Pastor Dick Bickings doing a fabulous monologue portraying Martin Luther nailing his 95 Thesis to a door that we had made and placed in the sanctuary as decoration. We also watched the Luther movie as a congregation one evening. Dr. Randy Grossman also came and did an incredible job giving us a lecture on the Reformation with a slide show of photos from his tour in Germany. Overall the whole month was a great success. Many within our congregation were encouraged.

All of the sermons preached at Ebenezer were expository in nature, simply explaining portions of God's Word. I was unable to preach a few times due to vacation. Pastor Dick Bickings faithfully stepped in and continued to feed the flock. I'm indebted to Pastor Bickings' faithfulness to God's Word. Wednesday night also continues to be a special time of teaching and prayer. I provide this study time as a small group especially for those who cannot attend on Sunday mornings. I finished teaching through the book of Matthew early on in the year. I also exposited through the books of 2 Chronicles & Ezra for the majority of the year.

In addition to my study time, I am also available for counseling and shepherding the flock.

Leadership development continues to be one of my focuses. In 2017 I offered the LEAD class for elder development. I was blessed with about 9 men. We covered Soteriology, the doctrines of Grace, ministry philosophy, Elder leadership, and character development. We read through several good books and exposited scripture together.

So much more could be written, but in short, here are a few highlights that God's grace permitted in 2017:

- 3 New member classes conducted throughout the year with 16 new members added to the Church
- Preached through Genesis 25-50, Reformation Series, 2 Chronicles, Ezra, Christmas series
- Taught a Leadership Class (LEAD) for Elder development with 9 men attending 5 Classes
- Chaired the nominating committee having 7 interviews, electing 1 new Deacon & 1 new Elder
- Lead a Kinship Group in my house with approximately 20 in attendance, teaching through 1 Samuel.
- Performed 9 funerals
- Performed 8 weddings
- Performed many hospital & home visits
- Performed premarital Counseling for 3 couples including 6-8 sessions each
- Many meetings with Church members/individuals for prayer/encouragement/counseling
- I participated as a member of the board of BFC Church Extension 6 meetings/year
- I participated as a member of the Transitional Leadership Team (TLT) for Forks Township Church Plant under the direction of Tim Zuck 4 meetings/year
- I chaired the TLT for Naples, Florida Church Plant under the direction of Jason Filbert 6 meetings/year
- Over 18 baptism interviews
- Over 16 membership interviews
- Performed 2 child dedications
- Continuing to mentor a couple of men on a regular basis
- Held staff meetings two times per month
- Mentored a pastoral intern meeting approximately 2 times per month
- Chaired the Elder meetings once per month
- Performed a lecture on "Refuting Baptismal Regeneration" invited by the local Lehigh chapter of Truth in Religion club.
- Led the Bible teaching segment for VBS (included drama) 5 days
- Attended monthly Welcome Desserts/Lunches for newcomers all year
- Held monthly telephone calls with Jason Filbert in Naples, FL for encouragement of Church plant
- Attended the BFC ministerial convention & BFC Annual Conference
- Was added to the BFC ministerial convention planning committee and participated in vision casting
- Attended the Shepherds Conference in April out in Los Angeles, CA
- Participated in every men's prayer breakfast 4/year
- Highlighted Miracle Month in December raising over \$20,000 for missions

2017 was a wonderful year. It is a joy to shepherd God's flock at Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church. The Pastors and staff are a true joy to work alongside. Each of us has a real passion to see Ebenezer flourish for the glory of God. Overall the church is doing very well. Attendance is steady, and the Lord blessed tremendously through the giving of His people. It is difficult to measure spiritual growth, but I believe that our people are becoming committed followers of Jesus Christ. The study through the book of Genesis provided strong teaching on the sovereign providence of God in our everyday lives. While it is difficult to understand, it became clear to all of us, that God providentially works out all things for His glory and our good. These are truths that we continue to learn. I'm so thankful for our elders and deacons. Serving alongside each of them is truly a joy as we strive to have a ministry that is pleasing to the Lord. I look forward to a great new year in 2018.

As I begin this year's annual report, I want to share with you some thoughts from my personal bible study trek through the New Testament, and stopping at the book of Philippians, I came across my life verse: "And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:6, ESV) I am reminded that God is proactively involved in not just my life, but all his elect, and that this activity will not be left incomplete! It is with this truth, that I present to you those things done for the glory of God in 2017.

The glory of God was seen several times throughout 2017 with our involvement in serving at the *Lynfield Community* in South Bethlehem. We also continued a men's prayer group on Saturday mornings to encourage men to be leaders in praying for their families, their church, and their country. We saw new growth and new groups in our *Kinship* groups.

The children's ministries leaders continue to direct our children toward spiritual growth as children learn the scriptures chronologically in their age appropriate Sunday School (Cross Time) classes, using **The Gospel Project** curriculum, and by memorizing scripture and learning biblical doctrine in the **Awana** program, and a Bible memory program geared for Kindergarten – 8th grade. We also held two evangelistic events, Vacation Bible School (VBS) in the summer, and a Candy Carnival in the fall in South Bethlehem's, Lynfield community.

The Student Ministries (HS & MS Youth Groups) met 2017 with a challenge to replace our much beloved Pastor Mark Culton who received a call from a church in Indiana. We first temporarily filled the teaching hole with the strong bible teaching of Mark Evans, hiring him part-time, January-May. We then proceeded to engage the search committee to prayerfully find the man the Lord had for us full-time. Praise the Lord He answered our prayer and brought Pastor Mike Notary and his beautiful family to fill that hole as Youth Pastor, beginning his ministry June 1, 2017. We deeply appreciate and praise the Lord for the hard work of the youth lead-ership staff who helped hold things together in the interim.

The adult ministries sought to equip our adults toward spiritual growth in 2017 through biblical expositional teaching in the Adult Sunday School Classes (Adult Electives), quarterly men's breakfasts, two Thursday morning men's bible studies, Saturday morning men's prayer time, various women's bible studies, and our Senior Fellowship.

Also in 2017, we continued to implement the state mandated background checks for children's ministry workers who are 18 yearsold and above. This, we believe, will provide the best possible security for the precious children placed in our care. In addition to these background checks, we improved safety/security by purchasing iPads for the teachers to enable them to check-in/check-out their students, have emergency contact and medical information at their fingertips, and to allow them access to the Children's Ministry (Kid's Crossing) policies and procedures.

For 2018, besides what has already been established in our own local church Discipleship Ministries, we plan to maximize the effectiveness of our outreach programs through our evangelism and teaching programs, with a move to provide a permanent presence in South Bethlehem's Lynfield Community. We will work on refining our discipleship programs for all ages.

Please continue to pray and ask the Lord what part you might have in fulfilling our vision for 2018, as we continue to be challenged by our volunteer needs, especially in the children's ministries, and a church wide vision to reach our Bethlehem community. Remember that we are in this together as the living, visible, functioning body of Christ.

Jan. 2017 – May 2017:

EBFC's Youth Ministry began a season of transition after Pastor Mark Culton accepted a call to a lead pastoral role at another church. Mark Evans, a former Youth Pastor at Calvary Bible Fellowship Church in Coopersburg, stepped into a teaching role on Tuesday nights at Ebenezer while the volunteer youth staff took care of administrative and logistical details in order to maintain the regular aspects of EBFC's youth ministry. Mark Evans began a study on Romans which he continued until my eventual hire and transition to EBFC in June. I couldn't image a smoother transition as I began my employment here in June and stepped into a very

healthy ministry with such capable volunteers.

June 2017-Dec. 2017:

Vision:

We have "branded" youth ministry this year in an attempt to further communicate our vision for EBFC's youth ministry. We believe this will help communicate our desire to unite youth and the church. We understand that communication is best with repetition and providing a visual reminder is important. Welcome to MERGE Youth Ministry where we are "uniting youth and the church!"

In order for youth to truly be united to the church youth must embrace the necessity of the church in their life while the church embraces the necessity of youth in its life. Youth are not the future of the church; they are an integral part of the church today as we serve the Body of Christ together.

Discipleship Opportunities:

Weekly MERGE Ministry Meetings: Every Tuesday night (excluding the 1st Tues. of the month) youth gather for our regularly scheduled MERGE Ministry. During this time, we participate in a gathering game or activity, transition to a time of musical worship, and then a teaching time followed by growth group break-outs.

Monthly Growth Groups: The first Tuesday of each month are Growth Group Nights for MERGE Ministry. Our growth groups are broken down by gender and grade. Volunteer leaders are assigned a growth group that they follow through MS or HS.

G3 Student Leadership: In early fall we began G3, our student leadership program at EBFC. G3 exists to challenge youth to "gather, grow, and go." It is essential for youth to *gather* together in fellowship, accountability, and study. During these times we should be *growing* both corporately and individually. As we grow we should *go* to the world with the hope of Christ.

Monthly Youth Staff Dinners: Jenn and I have begun meeting with our volunteer youth staff monthly in order to encourage, challenge, and grow in faith together.

Annual Youth Staff Retreat: We were blessed to be able to put together a Youth Staff Retreat this fall at my family's cabin in Laporte, PA. It was a wonderful time of stepping away from the busyness of life in order to slow down, get to know more about each other's stories, and pray for our ministry.

Study Opportunities:

Romans: Our youth studied Romans in which they learned the deep theological truths Paul presents in his letter as well as the challenge to practice "doing" theology as we offer the Hope of Christ to a world in need of His grace, mercy, and love.

A Study on Rest: Having completed our study on Romans we began a three-part study on the theme of rest throughout Scripture. We considered the problem of rest, the promise of rest, and the person of rest in Christ.

The Person of Jesus: As youth returned to a new school year we introduced our Person of Jesus Study that would keep us in the Gospels for the remainder of the semester. This study focused on the human characteristics of Christ as we were challenged to be His hands and feet.

1 Corinthians: 2018 begins with our study of Paul's letter to the church in Corinth. We will spend the majority of this school year and a portion of summer to taking an in-depth look at Paul's charge to the church in Corinth as he calls them from "Isolated

Infancy to Christ-like Community."

The Gospel Project: We continue to work through LifeWay's Gospel Project curriculum during our regular Sunday School hour between Sunday services. This semester's focus will be "The Church on Mission."

Events:

VBS: This summer many of our HS and MS youth served during our VBS week. Many participated in skits, music, and preparing/ providing snacks and drinks to the children.

Light In the City: The week following our VBS program at EBFC we had an opportunity to take an adapted version of the program to the Lynfield Community in South Bethlehem. Once again our MS and HS youth helped "staff" this program.

Dominican Republic Trip: 6 youth participated in EBFC's mission trip to the Dominican Republic. Pat and Carol Barry led the trip which allowed youth to participate in service projects and evangelism in the towns of -- Consuelo and Consuelito.

Candy Carnival: We were able to take EBFC's annual Candy Carnival to the Lynfield Community this year. This was yet another opportunity for our youth to reconnect with the children in that community.

Run for the Children: Youth helped as course guides, refreshment coordinators, clean-up crew members, and runners. And of course, they provided their youthful volume and enthusiasm as they cheered on race participants.

Fall Retreat: We were able to put on a MERGE fall retreat for our MS and HS students this year. We took a group of 50 youth and leaders to Three Springs Ministry for a weekend of fellowship, fun, and study. This year's theme was the "Cost of Following Christ."

Operation Christmas Child Packing Party: Youth helped coordinate our annual EBFC packing party this year. They were eager to provide items for these shoeboxes by contributing items from 4 different categories over a 4 week span at weekly MERGE meetings. We were able to pack 160 boxes to be sent overseas with the message of the hope we find in Christ.

Illuminite: Henri Darby continues to lead a group of student leaders as they put on a monthly Illuminite event on a Friday night. These are an outreach opportunity for youth to invite their friends who might not be interested in coming to church.

1. Worship Ministry:

A. Thank You!

What a privilege it has been to serve Ebenezer through the ministry of music! It is a true blessing to walk through life and bear each other's burdens as we prepare music, study God's word, and pray. I am thankful to be entrusted with the responsibility of developing and overseeing the facets of music ministry. Thank you for allowing me to minister to the lives of the church family through music and college age ministry!

B. Shepherding

Throughout the year I have had the opportunity to meet consistently with a number of the worship team members for accountability, prayer, and encouragement. This is such a joy to mutually be encouraged in the relationships within the church body.

It has also been a joy to finish our Wednesday night practices with a challenge from God's word and time of prayer. On Sunday mornings we meet before both services and continue our scripture reading and prayer focused on God's work being accomplished through our music team and the congregation as a whole, so that God is ultimately glorified through our morning services.

C. The mission behind the music & bringing new members into Worship Team

My responsibility in leading our congregation in corporate worship is to select songs and arrange them in a way that is honoring and glorifying to God. There are many preferences within the beauty of the diversity within our church. I take a lot of time to pray and study the Word in preparation for the songs we sing in our corporate services. 4) Outdoor Service- This was our 3rd annual outdoor service. We had well over 500 people gather together for fellowship and a meal. It was a joyous time of community and fellowship as we all worshipped together. Praise God for all the volunteers that made the outdoor service possible. All glory be to Christ!

F. Future Plans-

As I prayerfully consider the songs that are presented every Sunday I will continue to look for fresh arrangements of hymns and praise songs that incorporate deep Spiritual truths. 2. College Age Ministry

A. Thank You!

I wanted to simply say thank you to the church family for entrusting your college-age young adults to Lindsay's and my care. The college years are a crucial and formative season in the lives of young people. We are deeply grateful to be given the opportunity to walk through life with them and help them evaluate their identity in Christ.

The focus of College age shepherding is to continue to make disciples. This is done by taking advantage of the time throughout the year to be intentional in their lives, read, and mutually challenge each other in God's Word, and develop goals to help them grow. In 2017 this took place by meeting regularly at our home and as well as continuing a Bible study during the Sunday School hour. Much of my time during the year is also used in communicating with the students via text/phone calls or meeting to encourage, and pray with them.

I have really been overjoyed at what God is doing in the individual lives of our students. College ministry has its challenges being that half are out of state and regular get-togethers are not possible. But we have been seeing anywhere from 8 to 10 regular students, who are local and seeking fellowship and community.

<u>B. Vision & Goals</u>

-College age Sunday school class.

The numbers have varied from 25 on some Sundays to 3-4 on others. Adam Whitmer & Dan Trafford have taught soundly and really engaged our listeners to real life application in light of the challenges from God's Word. In 2018 we are beginning in the book of John. Dan will continue to teach as well as Max Whylings. Adam Whitmer will be taking a break from teaching.

-New Bible Studies starting in 2018

We are beginning a Bible study every-other week and the men and women will meet separately for growth and discipleship at our home. The college men will meet 2 weeks out of the month and the college ladies will meet the other 2 times during the month. Our goal is to have them invite their friends to study God's Word and talk through our roles in view of God's Word and grow in discipleship.

-Discipling

This year Lindsay and I have been discipling and reaching out to approximately 25 college age students throughout the year. We continue to send out e-mails and texts to our college students asking for updates, praises, and prayer requests going on in their lives. Please pray for these young men and women as they seek the Lord.

One of the most important areas to grow in is continuing to meet each young person where they are. We seek to encourage and challenge them for: having deeper intimacy with Christ, functioning well in the body of Christ, and to loving one another and our neighbor as ourselves (Matt. 22:34-40). These three goals are what Lindsay and I want to continue to help these young people understand and embrace.

C. Activities

Drive-In's, Beach Trip, Parties and meals at our home.

- I was given the opportunity to teach at the YACS retreat in mid-February this year at the SPADE Inn. It was a joy to fellowship with the group and teach through 1 Corinthians 13 and John 3.
- We hosted the Lehigh University international students for the 2nd year. We had almost 30 students come from Lehigh who were from all over the world. We had a number of opportunities to share about what we believe in relation to the Bible. Afterward, we were also able to continue relationships with some of the men who came, one of which I have been able to meet with on several occasions and share the Hope found in Christ. This continues to be a wonderful outreach for college students in cultivating relationships and giving an answer to the Hope that we have in Christ!

D. Future Plans

- 1) <u>Multiply in discipleship</u>: One of the basic goals for 2018 is to train up student leaders to invite others to church and bible studies.
- 2) <u>Church Integration</u>: We have a number of young people in our two Sunday services. My goal is to continue to look for college age (18-24) and really be intentional in getting to know them and get them plugged in.

3. Other Pastoral Involvement

1) **Visitation**- I have had the opportunity, on a number of occasions, to visit those who are in the hospital and pray and encourage them in the midst of physical or mental hardship. It has been a joy to grow in relationships with our church people as we lay the burdens down at the feet of Jesus

2) VBS Worship Team- with Cheryl Hutchinson leading the VBS week, once again they did an excellent job engaging the kids with music and drama that carried the gospel message in a simple fashion.

3) Light In The City-This year was a wonderful year of re-connecting in the lives of the children and their families at Lynfield in South Bethlehem. Shelly & Tom Carlstrom did a wonderful job overseeing and delegating the responsibilities of Light in the City. As we handed out over 25 bibles within the week we were seeing the kids taking time to read with their families and truly comprehend the truths of God's word. God continues to bless through the efforts of the field trips, LITC, and various other meetings with Roy and Malta throughout the year. We continue to pray through how we can continue to partner with them and establish a more consistent presence there. Please pray with us as the Spirit is planting many seeds in the lives of the children and their families.

4) **Dominican Republic Mission Trip**- In the beginning of July, Lindsay and I had the opportunity to take our first mission trip as a married couple with our church & World Servants to the Dominican. Church Leadership

"Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. I know that after my departure fierce wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves will arise men speaking twisted things, to draw away the disciples after them. Therefore be alert." Acts 20:28-31

It is a sobering thing to consider that Elders have been made so by the Holy Spirit to care for the Church of God and oversee the ministry. This calling causes all of us to tremble at the significance of our role and the accountability that we will have on that last day when we stand before Jesus, our Savior. We are reminded that the main ministries of the elders are the faithful preaching and teaching of the Word of God and prayer (Acts 6:4). We take these roles very seriously. Following is a list of areas that the Elder board gave strong consideration in 2017:

Prayer: Prayer is a vital part of what we do as Elders. Our hearts' desire is to be dependent upon the power of the Lord and seek His will regarding every issue we face. We also strive to diligently pray for the flock, which the Lord has made us overseers. We spend time each month breaking up into prayer groups and praying for our designated shepherd groups. Big decisions are always bathed in prayer seeking the Lord's will and not our agenda.

Spiritual Growth: We also spend a great deal of time reminding ourselves of what God expects of our character. To that end in 2017 we used Steven Miller's book on Spurgeon's Spiritual Leadership to sharpen one another. We covered topics like: prayer, faith, holiness, service, love for the Lord & Word, willingness to suffer, and zeal for proclaiming the Gospel. Each month we discussed these topics to encourage us to continue to grow in godliness and be the best leader we can be for the glory of God and the good of Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church.

Finances, Faith & Vision: There is always a balance of being good stewards with what God has given us and having faith that God will provide for the future vision. With the shortfall of 2016, we were forced to step out in faith with a larger budget, but knew that the Lord would provide. The finances of 2017 have been incredible. In short, Ebenezer was more than 10% over our projected income for the year. The Lord blessed tremendously and our people were faithful in giving. The elders continually keep one eye on our finances and one eye toward the heavens seeking the Lord's help.

Furthermore, Ebenezer has become the beneficiaries of the Elizabeth Heyer estate. Elizabeth Heyer attended EBFC many years ago when the church was on Main Street. She passed away and named EBFC one of her beneficiaries which will guarantee our ministry at a minimum \$20,000/year. The Elders would like to see this money be used for outreach in the city of Bethlehem, and not used for normal ministry expenses or upkeep of the building.

With this providential windfall the Elders have begun praying that the Lord would give us a vision to reach Bethlehem with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Recently we have been praying how the Lord would open doors for us to use this money to minister to the "least of these." A task force has been put together to investigate and pray and cast vision for the future. This vision has the potential to not only include the community known as Lynfield in South Bethlehem, but also other areas. We are not certain what this ministry will look like. However we are convinced that if the vision is focused to reach people in Bethlehem, that our church will be excited to jump on board with the ministry.

New Leadership: It is exciting to bring on Mike Notary as our new Youth Pastor. It took us a few months to interview him. The Lord led us to hire him and call him to full time ministry. We certainly miss Mark Culton, but are thankful that the Lord has brought us a man who loves young people and is devoted to teaching the Word of God faithfully. He also has embraced a vision, which encourages the parents to be the main spiritual leaders of the home. For this we are all very thankful. His precious wife and children also warm us. They are such a wonderful addition to our church. We believe that there are great things in store for us with Mike's leadership.

The LEAD class was also offered this year for potential new elder candidates. We were so blessed with nine men who all have a deep desire to be used to serve the local church. It is amazing to see how the Lord is raising up men who love doctrine, ministry, and people. None of these men were selected this year as candidates, but the current elder board is watching them closely knowing that the Lord will appoint some of them in due time. Some of the candidates are young and need continual growth. But we are excited about the future of the leadership of Ebenezer.

We also voted in a new Treasurer this year. We divided responsibilities and refocused the Treasurer position to finances only. Many of the other duties were given to the Finance Committee, namely the chairman, Byron Roth. We are very thankful for Joe Meier who stepped in as Treasurer to fill Andy Brimer's shoes.

Logistics, Property & Vision: This year the Elders decided to make some logistical changes. We moved the time of the first service from 8:45 to 8:30 am. While fifteen minutes doesn't seem like much, it fits into our vision providing more time between services for our people to fellowship with one another. We felt like friendliness and warmth and fellowship has been lacking. We hope that this change will help our people be a little more engaged with one another.

Furthermore, the Elders approved a great deal of spending this year. We approved spending for the HVAC over the sanctuary, new lighting in the sanctuary, and a small parking lot project. All of these projects were necessary to continue fulfilling our vision at Ebenezer. Furthermore, we hope that there will be a remodeling of the foyer in days to come that will open up a place where our people can fellowship with one another on a more intimate level.

One other logistical change we made this year involved corporate prayer. We decided it was necessary to incorporate prayer into our Sunday morning services for our missionaries. We now devote about 5-10 minutes every-other Sunday for selected missionaries. While it may be awkward for newcomers or those who are not accustomed to praying, we believe that prayer is the powerhouse of ministry. Every-other week we break up and pray in groups for our missionaries.

Ministry Health Evaluation: In 2017, the Elders determined to do ministry evaluation. Each month at our meetings we evaluated the following: Evangelism ministry, assimilation ministry, missions, senior fellowship, welcome ministry, & adult electives. We spent time praying and evaluating the effectiveness of these ministries providing input to the leader.

Caring & Shepherding: Overseeing our flock is most important. We, as elders, encourage one another to take seriously each individual who attends our church. Every elder is given a list of members & regular attendees, who they are asked to pray for, encourage, and contact on a regular basis.

Security: In light of the wicked events of 2017 in church settings across our country, the Elders asked the Deacons to review our security policy and present a plan for 2018. While we believe that God is sovereign and that our church doors should be open to all people, we do want to be wise and provide a safe place for our people to worship. A new security plan will be evaluated and implemented in 2018.

Goodbyes: It is always sad to say goodbye to those we love and appreciate. Wayne Batten felt led by the Lord to not renew his eldership for another term and so he formally retired from eldership at the end of 2017. Wayne has been an elder for 40+ years serving Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church faithfully. We are truly going to miss his fellowship, his wisdom and partnership in the ministry. We pray that the Lord will continue to bless him and his family. We know that Wayne will continually be seen serving the Lord at Ebenezer. We know that we will be able to lean on his wisdom if needed.

It is a joy to serve as the chairman of our elder board. I'm honored to serve alongside such godly men who love the ministry at Ebenezer. Children's Ministry: Kids Crossing

Discipleship Ministry

Awana:

We are in our fifth year of the AWANA program at Ebenezer. So far it has been a great year of teaching the Word of God to the children, and helping them to memorize scripture. AWANA stands for "Approved Workmen Are Not Ashamed," and that is our goal each Wednesday night. We want to teach and develop children to be obedient and confident followers of Christ.

AWANA meets Wednesday nights during the school year (September-May) from 6:30-8:00 pm. The program is available for children ages 3 through 5th grade. We average 50-60 kids each week in AWANA, and God has provided us with approximately 30 leaders. This is an answer to prayer as it takes many leaders to successfully run the program and give the kids the teaching and assistance they need. The kids in AWANA will memorize and recite approximately 2,000 verses this year. Praise the Lord!

We are grateful to the Elders of Ebenezer for teaching the children each Wednesday night. This is done on a rotating schedule and is a wonderful opportunity for the kids to not only hear the Word of God taught, but to get to know the Elders on a more personal level. AWANA provides the Elders with a curriculum and PowerPoint to use in teaching the lessons.

I am continually thankful for Pastor Dick and Rachel Marks for all of their assistance, help, and support in leading this ministry. Furthermore, we are so blessed with wonderful leaders in the secretaries, game leaders, Cubbies workers, Sparks leaders and T&T leaders. It would be impossible to have a successful ministry without each one of them. I give thanks for everyone. My prayer is that we will all continue to serve the Lord and give Him the glory for all that He has done and will do in AWANA!

Bible Memory Program:

The Bible Memory Program's goal is to encourage and motivate students in Kindergarten through eighth grade to memorize the Word of God so that they will carry it with them the rest of their lives. The program is open to students who attend Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church's Sunday School. The program took place January 8 through April 30, 2017.

This year saw an increase in the number of participants in the program. 22 children successfully completed the Bible Memory Program. The children were able to choose from a Hackman's gift card, a Christianbook.com gift ard or a partial camp scholarship for their award. 2 of the children chose the \$35 Hackman's gift card as their award. 9 of the children chose the \$35 Christianbook.com gift card. 1 chose the \$70 camp scholarship to Explorer Girls' Camp and 10 chose the \$70 camp scholarship to Victory Valley Camp. 9 of the children participating earned an extra bonus (\$10 gift card for Hackman's or Christianbook.com) by memorizing the books of the Bible and reciting them to us. With the upcoming closing of Hackman's Bible Book Store, we will no longer be able to offer that option as an award for the program.

The program ministered to 12 families in the church. We are encouraged to hear how this program affects not only the students memorizing the Word, but also the families involved. There are several families who have been faithful over the years to be involved and have their children complete the program. It is our hope and prayer that in the coming year there will be an even greater participation of families and more children to "hide God's word" (Psalm 119:11) in their hearts.

Reaching Arms for the Gospel

We continue to be blessed by faithful preaching from the pulpit with a consistent emphasis regarding our responsibility as believers to proclaim the gospel to those who are lost. In 2017 we continued to ensure materials were available to aid church members in their individual evangelistic efforts, i.e. tracts, Gospel of John books, DVDs, and prayer cards. In addition, to encourage individual outreach, the 318 Team established monthly evangelism meetings and were consistently held during the fourth quarter of the year. These meetings are intended to be a source of individual encouragement, an opportunity for personal testimony, prayer, and a short devotional is given. Corporate and individual evangelism opportunities for the month are also discussed. These monthly meetings have been faithfully led by Matt Zmarzley and participation is growing!

Community Outreach

We have continued to have an effective presence in the Lynnfield community under the faithful leadership of the Carlstrom family. Light in the City, a VBS program at Lynnfield, was successfully held in July and other community outreach including after school programming and Bible study has continued in 2017. We are very thankful for Tom and Shelly along with Pastors Dick, Jeremy, and Mike who have committed to a presence in the Lynfield community. Pastor Dick has established a ministry team and the team is continuing to pray, brainstorm, and ask God to direct our ministry efforts in the South Bethlehem community. In 2017 we also continued to advertise to the community to create awareness in our local area regarding services and ministry opportunities available at Ebenezer. We invested in local mailings prior to Easter and Christmas services as this is a seasonal time where unchurched people are often seeking opportunities to attend church services. Once again I want to offer praises to God for a faithful group of people who are committed to going out as a team to reach the lost throughout the year. Matt Edmunds continues to lead teams to Staten Island for open air preaching and evangelizing on the Staten Island Ferry. Steve Leaser again organized a program for "in-home" outreach programming through Harvest America. Additionally, members from the 318 Evangelism Team periodically walked the streets of downtown Bethlehem and Allentown handing out tracts and evangelizing. If this is something you'd be interested in doing, please attend one of the monthly 318 Evangelism Meetings for more information.

Outreach Abroad

In 2017 I had the privilege to lead an intergenerational team from Ebenezer to Consuelo, Dominican Republic for a short-term mission trip. We participated in worship, home visits for prayer and evangelism, worked on a construction project and ministered to 200+ children daily at a Kid's Club Bible program.

In 2018 Pastor Tim will be overseeing our 318 Evangelism Ministry as I transition to my new responsibilities as Chairman of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

The purpose of the Kinship program is for each group to be a microcosm of Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church. Kinship groups provide smaller informal gatherings for growing in our faith, and spending time in fellowship with one another. Goals are to nurture, fellowship, worship, care, train, serve, and grow in the knowledge of God. Kinship strives to take various people with different experiences and backgrounds and assimilate them into one body and one faith.

In 2017, the Lord has continued to bless and move this program forward in such a powerful way. Efforts were focused this past year around the key areas below:

- To update the Kinship Group Brochure
- To inform the congregation about the Kinship Group Ministry through various means in August, and to assimilate all those interested into appropriate groups
- To raise up new Kinship group shepherds/leaders, as needed
- To develop more Kinship group shepherds/leaders from within existing groups
- To assist current shepherds/leaders by meeting one-on-one with them, as needed

The Lord blessed the program with increased Kinship leadership and more small groups. Four new leaders were added, Mike Coldren, Nate Gore, Mike Hard, and Laszlo Onody, along with three new Kinship groups. The groups assimilated over 30 "new" adults and children over this past year. As is always the case, a number of people left groups due to various reasons (life changes, moving away, death, etc.). The challenges that presented in 2017 were met with more leadership, additional groups, and increased participation! We praise the Lord for His provisions! Amen!! 2017 also, saw the return of our Recommended Reading Months program. Elder Ministry

The Lord blessed in 2017. We performed 3 membership classes. We added 16 members to the flock this year. Following is a summary:

This brings our membership total to 364 at the end of 2017. This is a drop in 56 members for the year. Loss in membership is mainly due to deaths (9), church discipline (4), moved away (7), transferred to another church (7), or delinquent members who have not responded to encouragement to return to worship (29). This is just indicative of life issues. It is disappointing however, that several have drifted away from the Lord. We continue to pray for them to return to fellowship with the Lord's people and a desire to live their lives for the glory of God.

In 2016, we instituted a process whereby we evaluate members who do not attend faithfully. The Elder board is very concerned about these members and we do everything in our power to contact them and encourage them to return to worship. While we do not believe attending worship is necessary for salvation, it is certainly an indication of the spiritual condition of an individual's heart. Lack of attendance may be an indication that hearts are being led away from a pure devotion to Christ. Once these members are delinquent for 6 months they are presented to the congregation on a formal Care List. This happens two times a year, once in January and once in July. The congregation is encouraged to go after these individuals. If the delinquent members do not respond then they are removed from the membership by church vote after being absent for a year. We believe this process is in accordance with the teaching of our Lord in Matthew 18. We continue to pray for everyone who has left our fellowship. Some have moved away for good reasons. Some have left to go to other good Bible believing churches. But our main concern is for those who are not attending anywhere and it is apparent that their hearts have grown cold toward the Lord and His Church.

Church discipline was performed on a few members this year. It is difficult to do but we believe that discipline is the most loving thing we can do. Just as our heavenly Father disciplines His children, so the Church is required to discipline members who refuse to repent from sin clearly delineated in Scripture. Most of the discipline procedures were simply the dropping of delinquent members.

The Elders continue to keep watch over the flock here in Bethlehem. Each of our 14 Elders has been given a group of members and attendees with whom to keep in contact. It is our hearts' desire to provide pastoral care to every attendee of Ebenezer, in hopes that we all will produce fruit in keeping with repentance (Matt 3:8) and continue to persevere in faith, love and holiness giving evidence of the regenerating work of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

In order to do this, we focus our efforts on training men how to be the godly leaders and examples that Christ commanded in their homes, jobs, society, and church. This training is done in the following ways:

- <u>Bible Studies</u> Weekly Men's bible studies were held throughout 2017:
 - ♦ Tuesday evenings/Saturday mornings "The Bethel Series" (for men & women), taught by Jason Lee (January-April), and Dick Bickings (October-November).
 - ♦ Thursday mornings 6:15 am, taught/facilitated by various men in the group
 - ♦ Thursday mornings 9:00 am, taught/facilitated by various men in the group
- <u>Prayer Group</u> a Saturday morning group set aside specifically for men to get together and pray...for the homes, marriages, children, wives, church, country, etc. We begin with a passage of scripture (usually the Psalms), and use it as a pattern to pray.
- <u>Breakfasts</u> Well-attended men's breakfasts were held quarterly, providing fellowship, teaching, worship time, and prayer. A faithful crew of men cooked (directed by Bob Guadagnino) and set up (directed by Jim Travisano) for this event very early each Saturday morning. The worship time was led by, Dan Hutchinson or Randy Shelly. The theme of this year's teaching time was entitled "Me? A Spiritual Leader?" which looked at four ways that scripture defined Spiritual Leadership, "the *command* to lead," "the *consequence* of not leading," "the *characteristics* of a Spiritual leader."
- <u>Community/Church Outreach</u> The men were called upon frequently throughout the year to lend a hand whether it was for someone who was moving, or some other physical labor.

Praise the Lord for providing an excellent men's leadership team to provide ideas and implement plans to keep this vital ministry on track.

A recap on what the Saved to Serve process entails:

- 2) After completing the class, there is a one-on-one consultation which is designed to assist you in finding a meaningful place of service according to your ministry fit.
- 3) Lord willing, the result should be meaningful service and character development *being transformed by Christ while serving for His Glory and edifying others!*

In addition to the formal class times, I have been blessed to work through this process one-on-one with individuals throughout the year. Another blessing was having the opportunity to begin working with ministry leaders on specific ministry health and evaluating the assimilation process within those ministries. I've really appreciated the honest perspectives and insight of various leaders and fellow members of Ebenezer in regards to serving and the assimilation process.

Some goals for 2018:

- 1) Continue to be available at Ebenezer on Wednesday nights to teach Saved to Serve and also seek opportunities to disciple individuals in the area of biblical servanthood particularly those members who are not actively serving in the body.
- 2) Continue to connect and follow-up with previous participants to check-in with and encourage them as they seek to be faithful in serving.
- 3) Meet with more ministry leaders to evaluate the health of the various ministries and the specific needs they may have.
- 4) Schedule regular times to meet with the ministry assimilation team to discuss how to be most effective in encouraging faithful service within the local body.
- 5) Develop a strategy to encourage more opportunities for group serve dates.

In closing, I want to encourage each of you to consider these questions: What are the things that God has laid His hands on you to do? When is the last time you examined how the Lord is leading you to serve in the local body? Are you serving sacrificially for His glory and building up the body? *"But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves."* James 1:22

And he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. And as was his custom he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and he stood up to read. And the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. Some of the projects completed this year were:

- Driveway was widened and curbing was added on the right side, the large cracked areas in the main parking lot were repaired, and some of the storm drain areas were repaired.
- Replaced the sewage pipe from the back of the church in the playground area out to the connection near the flower bed on the west end of the church. These areas were refilled and seeded or mulched where needed.
- Replaced the roof outside the sound room, three of the rooftop HVAC units for the sanctuary and office wing, and relocated and replaced one of the bathroom exhaust fans.
- The stage lighting in the sanctuary was replaced with a new long lasting LED system.
- The sound system in the Fellowship hall was replaced and upgraded.
- The parsonage was repaired and renovated to increase its value for the proposed sale. The interior was painted throughout, some exterior painting was done, all the flooring was replaced, all electrical outlets and switches were replaced. The light fixtures in the dining room, kitchen, all bathrooms, front room and rear exterior were replaced. The bathrooms were updated with new vanities, counter tops and mirrors. The front door was replaced. The basement staircase was enclosed and all electric was brought up to code. All smoke and carbon monoxide detectors were replaced and an occupancy permit was obtained from Bethlehem township. Yard was cleaned up, mulched and lawn reseeded where needed, rain gutters were cleaned out and repaired. I would like to give a special thank you to all the volunteers who helped with these repairs and renovations.

2018 capital projects may include:

- Replace the stove/range in the kitchen.
- Hot seal cracks, seal-coat the entire parking lot and driveway and repaint all the lines.
- Replace the lighting in the sanctuary, foyer, and fellowship hall.
- Replace the flooring in the lobby and foyer area.

Future Capital projects may include:

- Replace HVAC units for the foyer, rooms 12-14 and BCS hallway
- Replace windows in the South Fellowship hall
- Replace both church signs.
- Replace the Fellowship hall roofing panels and shingles when needed.
- Replacement of the original windows on the east side of the lobby and nursery area and also the north side of the building BCS library and classrooms 4-5.
- Expand the parking lot when needed due to growth.

We greatly appreciate all those who signed up to take care of the various flowerbeds. It was a tremendous help and they looked great.

I would like to thank the volunteers who helped Kevin Kritzberger and the property committee throughout the year with the many hours of donated labor to help maintain and improve our building and grounds.

I would also like to thank the committee members who served with me this year on the property committee. It was a pleasure working with you and I look forward to serving with you again on the committee for 2018.

Transportation Committee

Deacon Ministry

Number of trips (use frequency) of the church vehicles in 2017 was slightly less than in 2016; the number of rental vans required in 2017 increased slightly, due to a weekend retreat which had high attendance. Rental vehicles are used (in addition to EBFC's vehicles) when the ministry is in need of transportation which requires more seating than EBFC's vehicles provide, and or when it is impractical for multiple volunteers' vehicles to be driven.

Mini-Bus [2008 Ford E-350 Super Duty XLT Omnibus, by ElDorado National]:

- January: While in for diagnosis of an inoperative parking brake, Mavis Discount Tire (Nazareth) found rear brake rotors and shoes/pads rusted and deteriorated, as well as one of the rear calipers failing to completely release or fully compress.
 I also noted what sounded like the serpentine belt intermittently squealing; Mavis inspected and found the serpentine belt to be dry rotting. As a result of the significant labor associated with dual rear wheel brake maintenance, it was decided to replace both calipers as well as the other parts which were unserviceable; the following parts were replaced for a total cost of \$1,489.94:
 - ♦ Left & Right rear brake rotors and calipers
 - ♦ Left and right rear pads/shoes
 - Serpentine belt
 - ◊ Oil & filter
- November: The right rear mud flap was again found to be loose, the flap support bar bent, and laying on the tire; it was
 removed and will be repaired or replaced in 2018. Also, the main rear tailpipe bracket was found to be broken, causing
 the tailpipe to hang solely from the vibration damper mount. Kevin Kritzberger was able to reposition and re-secure the
 remaining portion of the bracket with in-house hardware. Total Cost: Blood, sweat, and Kevin's lunch break.

Van [2011 Ford E-350 Super Duty XLT]:

• October: During a day trip, significant vibration at certain speeds, was noted by the driver. Upon inspection, the left rear tire was found to be slightly misshapen. Mavis Discount Tire (Nazareth) found the tire's internal support belt to be broken; both rear tires were replaced. It was recommended that we replace the right rear tire as well, as it was at its max expected life span (NHTSA 6-10 years) and also showing signs of dry rot. Total Cost: \$284.95

Thanks to Kevin Kritzberger for serving as our onsite Tailpipe Repair Technician, and Fred Parris for serving as our primary Driver Trainer in 2017.

Property Committee Ministry

Responsibilities of the Technology Committee include maintaining the wired and wireless networks, purchase, deployment and troubleshooting of EBFC's hardware and software, and upkeep and hosting (by Kim White) of EBFC's Web Site, aplaceforyou.org.

In 2017...

Hardware & Infrastructure: Windows Server, 18 workstations, 4 Chromecasts; Router, 6 Wireless Access Points, Multiple Switches

- A donated flat screen TV was mounted on the wall in the conference room
 - ♦ A Chromecast and Blu-ray player were also installed.
 - A desktop computer and webcam were installed to allow video conference. In 2018, we plan to install a dedicated USB microphone to resolve audio issues with skype.
- Configured, tested, and implemented a VPN for EBFC Staff to use while outside EBFC's network; to also allow for a secured connection when Tech team members remotely access EBFC workstations for troubleshooting or to perform general IT maintenance tasks.
- Configured an external network drive to accept automated 'Time Machine' (Apple's backup program) backups from Pastor Tim's laptop, and then backup to the server.
- During the first week of May, EBFC's Windows server had multiple errors occur, failed to reboot, and remained offline for approximately 15 hours. Automated Startup/OS disk repairs failed to run, and a manual repair of the corrupted windows directory was necessary to fix the issues. The server has remained online and fully operational since then.
- The Finance workstation also crashed, due to a failure of the aftermarket video card; the video card was removed, and the integrated video (VGA) was reconnected to the display. The computer was taken offsite (2 days) for diagnosis and repair by the Tech Team.
- Purchased and installed a new HP All-In-One printer/scanner/copier for the Facilities Manager, after attempted repair of his previous printer failed.
- Performed regular firmware updates on the router/firewall and wireless access points.
- Reformatted and deployed a donated laptop as an Adult Elective presentation workstation.
- Two additional Blu-ray players were purchased for use on a designated projector cart, and TV cart.
- Purchased replacement monitors for the Office Administrator's dual screen workstation.
- Purchased and installed RAM upgrades for the Finance computer, Facility Manager, and Worship/Youth Assistant workstations, to 8GB total RAM per workstation.
- A new laptop was purchased for the Senior Pastor (Apple Refurbished MacBook Pro), and a desktop (Dell OptiPlex) for the Office Assist.
- An additional WAP was purchased to solve the issue of inadequate Wi-Fi coverage in certain areas of the building; multiple mounting brackets were also purchased and will be used in 2018 to relocate all WAPs below the drop ceiling, to further increase signal strength and minimize interference.

Software:

- Completed upgrade of all primary workstations to Microsoft Office 2016.
- Continue to troubleshoot a Windows Update error on the Library workstation.
- Exited the testing phase of the FileMaker Pro database; Pastor Dick completed the changeover from our old database software (Servant Keeper) to an in-house/locally hosted database (FileMaker Pro Server), and the office staff began solely entering data into FMP. Dick continues to make changes to the "look and feel," and the functionality. In 2016, at the beginning of FMP trials, in light of firewall and network conflicts it was deemed beneficial to extend an offer to BCS to host their existing FMP database collectively with ours; they graciously agreed and offered their current FMP server a Mac Mini as a host computer. Pastor Dick completed RAM and OS upgrades to the Mac Mini and completed migration from the MacBook Pro we were using to host the software during testing, to BCS' Mac Mini.
- Due to the server crashing and being offline (May), QuickBooks was also unusable during this time, since it was hosted on the server. No data was lost - just unreachable during the downtime. However, it was decided to switch from QuickBooks Premier to QuickBooks Online. Joe Meier (Treasurer) persevered through multiple complications, and completed the migration process to QuickBooks Online.

Also in 2017, the committee completed and implemented the EBFC Technology Policy.

- Joe Meier for the multiple days of work he spent migrating EBFC's Financial data to QuickBooks Online, as well as Debbie Griffin for the many extra hours she put in learning the new system.

- Kim White as she continues to modernize and maintain our industry leading website.
- Pastor Dick Bickings has continually devoted many hours to implementing, and constantly updating, our FileMaker Pro database, ensuring a robust, efficient, and reliable system.

Elder Ministry

The goal of the Welcome Ministry is to warmly receive visitors to our church and represent the love of Christ to them. There are two parts to this ministry: Welcoming and Visitor Follow-up.

Welcoming involves Greeting and the Welcome Center. We have continued the practice of greeting one another in the service before the singing time, as a way to recognize and welcome visitors on Sunday morning. This has proven to be a great way to meet and welcome visitors to our church in a winsome and comforting way. The Welcome Center provides a central location for information about our church and its ministries. We have decided that it is advantageous to have someone remain behind the desk as well as people out front greeting. Many visitors have utilized the Welcome Center to find out more about the church and receive a visitor packet.

We have a team consisting of ~24 Greeters who serve faithfully once monthly, prior to and following each service, helping others to feel welcome, orienting them toward classes, making introductions, and offering information about current ministries and programs. Starting this year, Mark Dammeyer has been faithfully serving behind the welcome desk every Sunday after 1st service. My wife, Anmarie, is going to help me stay organized in 2018 by sending monthly emails and assisting in recruiting new greeters. My entire family will be joining the greeting team for 2018. A vision for the new year is to increase the number of greeters serving after the 1st service and before Sunday School so we can place at least one greeter at each of the side sanctuary doors to hand out welcome packets to newcomers and invite them to the newcomer luncheon.

The other part of welcoming is visitor follow-up. Once someone has come to visit our church, it is important to follow-up that visit with some form of contact. The contact can be in the form of a letter, a phone call or a personal visit. This year we have had several volunteers sending each new visitor a personal letter within the first week of their visit. Many have also been contacted by email and invited to the Newcomer Luncheon. Mike & Judy Sicardi and Mark Dammeyer are a tremendous help in this area of the Welcome Ministry.

Staring in April the Newcomer Dessert was successfully changed to a Newcomer Luncheon that meets the 4th Sunday of every month from 12:45-1:45pm in the Serving Room. We have had more people attend and also have had more Elders stop in to meet the attendees. We had the privilege of hosting ~52 newcomers at our luncheons this year. This will continue to be an important part of the welcome ministry as a way for visitors to get information and feel welcomed. The luncheon allows visitors to meet the Pastor, church members and other new attendees in an informal setting to find out more about our church and have their questions answered.

There has been some thought on how to engage visitors in between services. One thought is to invite visitors to come to the serving room

after first service for coffee and to meet pastors, elders and church members. With the change in service time, there is now more time for fellowship between the first service and Sunday School. There is the opportunity to develop that time and make it a blessing for members and visitors alike. We anticipate another great year of welcoming and greeting visitors to our church. I welcome any suggestions for ways to better engage and welcome the visitors to Ebenezer.

Elder Ministry

As we reflect on 2017, we should all take time to thank the Lord for his provision this year. EBFC is His ministry and he has given us abundant funds to fulfill His purpose.

Total income for the year was \$1,107,901.41 which was \$119k over our planned budget of \$988,614.72. As you remember, that based upon our giving trend going into 2017 the budget was a concern but we were trusting that God would provide and He has.

Our total expenditures for the year were \$1,061,365.41 which was \$72k over budget. This total does include the additional expenditure of \$115k approved by the congregation for three specific projects this year (air conditioning, lighting and the parking lot). Although we had this additional expenditure our savings for the year increased by \$7k over last year's total. Additional money was spent in both Discipleship and Evangelism for the year and we have savings in church finance and compensation.

We also received our first check from the Heyer Trust. Mrs. Heyer grew up at EBFC and at the time of her death included EBFC in her will. We will be receiving a \$20,000 gift from her estate each year during the next 20-year period. Pastor Tim, Pastor Dick and Byron met with the trustees of the estate. During the meeting, they learned about how Ebenezer had an impact on her as a child and that she always remembered going to church with her father. The impact lasted her entire life and she wanted to give back to Ebenezer. I am sure that those serving at the time would have not known the lasting impact of their efforts. The Board of Elders discussed and determined that these funds be used to reach the greater Bethlehem area and as such we have established a designated fund. The Elders will be presenting the vision for the use of these funds this year.

This was also a year of change with regards to how we manage our finances and payroll. Both Joe Meier and Debbie Griffin have spent significant time implementing these changes and we should be thankful for their efforts. We made a change to QuickBooks Online which will help in our reporting and administration of our financial records. We also transitioned to an outsourced solution for our payroll. With the complexities of the constantly change tax laws use of a third party for payroll is a good thing for the church.

We also want to thank the members of the Finance and Audit committees for their time and efforts. The Finance Committee members are Joe Meier, Debbie Griffin, George Hardy, Dale Tsudy, and Byron Roth. The Audit Committee members are Dale and Gail Tsudy, Marge Harris, and Rachael Kuntz.




